#### **SECTION-B**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY & SWOC ANALYSIS**

#### CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Haldia Government College was established on 20<sup>th</sup> November, 1988. The college is situated in the port city of Haldia and enjoys a unique position in catering to the requirements of a mixed population of urban and rural students. It is the only government college in Haldia and thereby occupies a pivotal position on the academic areana. It has more than forty full time faculty members and around two thousand students.

The college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, West Bengal. It provides education at the undergraduate level in eleven subjects and two at the postgraduate level. The college also offers a self finance vocational course at undergraduate level. It boasts of rich tradition of cultural, social and intellectual progress.

The vision of the college is to provide excellent education to young minds enabling them to become responsible citizens of the country and to equip them with the requisite skills to make them proper human resource and enable them to sustain in better way.

- ❖ The college follows the curriculum framed by Vidyasagar University and does not enjoy the freedom of autonomy. Besides Humanities and Science, the college offers a self financing career oriented programme in Tourism and Travel Management.
- ❖ Under the aegis of Netaji Subhas Open University classes are held in various undergraduate and postgraduate subjects.
- ❖ Post graduate courses in Bengali, Chemistry and Geography are also offered under Directorate of Distance Education, Vidyasagar University.
- ❖ Teachers of the college are extremely competent and dedicated and are capable of offering the best possible guidance to their students. Most of them are actively involved in research work of the highest order.
- ❖ ICT based teaching is practiced in regular way. Film shows are held by the Humanities departments for the benefit of students.
- ❖ Students are encouraged to participate in seminars, debates, workshops and also in cultural activities.
- ❖ All departments organise seminars, invited lectures and workshops on various issues of academic and social relevance. Parents-Teachers meetings are regularly held to discuss and monitor the performance of students.
- ❖ Meetings with the Governing Body and stakeholders are held to inform them about college matters and decisions and their valuable suggestions are taken note of.
- ❖ The NSS units of the college regularly hold blood donation camps, provide services to the rural population and programmes on medical awareness.

- ❖ NCC units of the college organizes classes and community benefited programmes regularly.
- ❖ Freshers' Welcome and the Annual College Social are held.
- ❖ The college has an efficient Career Counselling Cell and regular placement programmes are held for last few years.
- ❖ Various members of the faculty interact with the University as members of Board of Studies and implement new ideas and plans to benefit the students.
- ❖ They also participate in workshops and seminars organised by the University and other Research bodies.

#### CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college is aware of the fact that Teaching-learning and Evaluation are the most important steps for any educational institution. Following are the major highlights of our Teaching-learning and Evaluation criterion:

- ❖ The college ensures wide publicity as far as possible for its admission procedure both in Undergraduate and Postgraduate courses. Transparency is ensured by the introduction of online admissions since 2013 − 14, the entire admission process is done through online system.
- ❖ Merit is the sole criterion for admission. However, as per government norms seats are reserved for SC, ST, OBC (both A and B Category) and differently-abled students.
- ❖ The institution maintains a strict vigil on the admission process and conducts regular supervision on all its aspects round the year. Student Profiles are reviewed by the departments and duly communicated to the Admission Committee for counselling.
- ❖ The Institution strictly follows all Government rules and regulations regarding admission of the differently abled students. They are given special guidance and counselling by the teachers of the respective departments to arouse their self -confidence.
- ❖ To bridge the knowledge gap of the students various strategies are taken by the institution. Slow learners are identified to be attended specially. Personalised interaction with the teachers helps the students to eliminate their weak points as well as to nurture their hidden quality through participation in seminars, workshops etc.
- ❖ The college has adopted a variety of measures to sensitize its students and staff on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc.
- ❖ The institution also identifies the special learning and educational needs of the advanced learners on the basis of feedback of the teachers concerned.
- The college plans and organizes teaching, learning and evaluation schedules in a number of ways like preparation of academic calendars, curriculum Plan, conduct of internal assessments, class tests, project evaluations and end-semester examinations for PG courses.

- ❖ Special care is given to the weaker students in the remedial and tutorial classes. Advanced students are encouraged to pursue their goals and given assistance by the teachers according to their needs.
- ❖ The IQAC monitors all academic activities of the college relating to all stakeholders (students, teachers, research scholars and other staff). Its constant vigil is on total quality management within the institution.
- ❖ Learning is made learner-centric through a variety of ways like individual attention from teachers, student-seminars, cultural competitions etc. as well as the activities of a number of bodies under the Teachers' Council like Counselling and Placement Cell, Gender Sensitization Committee Against Sexual Harassment, Anti-ragging subcommittee etc.
- Critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper are nurtured actively in and outside classrooms. The teachers' attitude towards students contributes a lot to this. Exposure to scholars and educationists from other institutions as well as holding of different awareness programmes are other important factors.
- ❖ The library and the laboratories of the college are constantly augmented through different grants for the benefit of the teaching-learning process. The college library is a subscriber of INFLIBNET NLIST database. It has also initiated necessary steps for automation of the library through KOHA software.
- ❖ Proper completion of curriculum within due time is always the foremost priority of the institution. Whatever challenges might present themselves, this priority never takes a backseat for Haldia Government College.
- ❖ The Principal monitors the functioning of the departments by regularly checking the teachers' Daily Self Appraisals and conferring with HoDs on pertinent matters. Regular Parent-Teacher meetings are also conducted to apprise the guardians about the academic affairs of the college and the progress of their wards.
- ❖ The College also informs and involves the Students' Union and the Alumni to muster support to ensure optimum results from Teaching-Learning.
- ❖ Being a government college, the institution doesn't enjoy any autonomy in the recruitment and retention of the permanent teachers. These teachers are appointed by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal as per the recommendation of Public Service Commission, West Bengal. The permanent full-time teachers are also transferred to different government colleges within the state as per the government orders issued by the Higher Education Department from time to time.
- ❖ Out of a total of 44 permanent teachers in the college 17 have Ph.D. as their highest qualification and 5 teachers have M.Phil. as their highest qualification. 22 have M.A. / M.Sc. as their highest qualification. Almost all the teachers either NET or SET qualified. The teachers are encouraged to participate in Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, Summer/Winter Schools etc.

- ❖ Faculties across different disciplines are invited as resource persons in workshops /seminars/conferences organized by external professional agencies. Further the participate in external workshops/seminars/conferences recognized by national/international professional bodies. They also present papers in workshops / seminars / conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies.
- ❖ The college has introduced student-feedback system (from the outgoing B.A. / B.Sc. 3rd year Honours and M.A./M.Sc. fourth semester students) to evaluate the teachers.
- ❖ As per the guidelines of the University, the College has adopted the 1+1+1 method of evaluation for the undergraduate course, instead of the earlier 2+1 method. At the Postgraduate level, the departments operate through a semester system (4 semesters over a 2-year time span).
- The institution ensures rigor and transparency in the internal assessment and weightings assigned for the overall development of students through a number of modalities.
- ❖ The main graduate attribute of this institution is to impart quality based higher education with an aim to acquire knowledge and develop critical thinking among the students. The questioning spirit and the urge to form original opinions are also at the top of the list of priorities.
- ❖ The college has clearly stated learning outcomes and clearly defined strategies for all the academic and co-curricular activities carried out every year.
- ❖ The institution monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes through a number of ways which include university and college examination results, seminar presentations, project works, inter and intra college competitions in academic and co-curricular activities.
- ❖ It studies the performance of students through departmental teachers, organizing various seminars, workshops and special lectures, assessing formal and informal feedbacks from different stakeholders and giving special attention to PG students for preparations in NET/SET/GATE examinations etc. The institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as well as student feedback as an indicator for evaluating student-performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

#### CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- ❖ In accordance with UGC guidelines, a separate 'Research Project Subcommittee' operates in the college.
- ❖ Teachers with Ph.D. degree are encouraged to pursue active research in their respective areas. These are very often in collaboration with other departments and other institutes.
- ❖ The Research Project Subcommittee has proposed to conduct more inter-disciplinary interactions through collaborative seminars and conferences. These types of inter-

- department or inter-institute seminars have been organized by both arts and science departments.
- ❖ Many eminent Scientists/academicians from IIT/IISc/IISER/CSIR-institutes/universities have visited different academic departments of this college during seminars/conferences, delivered special lectures and interacted with students.
- ❖ During the period 2011-2016, about 17 faculty members of this college have been granted UGC-Minor research projects, some have been completed and some projects are ongoing. Dr. Shubhankar Samanta has been awarded DST-Fast track project of Rs. 24.6 lac (June 2014-May 2017; he has been transferred to Bidhannagar College on Feb'2016)
- ❖ Many high end sophisticated instruments like Fluoremeter, UV-VIS spectrophotometer, Rotary Evaporator, Cold water circulator, UV Chember etc (Dept. of Chemistry); Planck's constant set up, Band Gap set up, Electromagnet, e/m set up by Thompson's method, Prism Setup, Cathode Ray Oscilloscope etc. (Dept. of Physics); Anthropometer, Sliding Calliper, Spreading Calliper, Pelvimeter, Cubic craniphore, Human Skeleton (5 in number), Human Skull (15 in number) , different types of rocks, prehistoric stone tools, different type of cast material etc. (Dept. of Anthropology); Global Positioning system, Prismatic compass, Barometer, Soil testing kit, Clinometer etc. (Dept. of Geography) are available for teaching and research.
- ❖ These instruments are very useful for project based research purpose. Faculty members from other colleges and institutions also use these instruments for their research purpose. Several international research publications have been achieved from this institution (RSC Advances, 2014, 4, 2474-2481; Synthetic Comunication. 2015, 45, 625-634; Tetrahedron Letters 2014, 55, 6411-6415)
- Some faculty members of this college have post-doctoral research experience in India and abroad, some have working experience in industry and this helps the students in their career counselling.
- ❖ The faculty members of postgraduate departments often arrange special classes for NET/GATE examinations.
- ❖ The College provides major infrastructural facilities like library, laboratory, computer and internet facilities to pursue research activities.
- ❖ The regular Postgraduate courses in Chemistry and Geography incorporate Industry Visits, Field work and individual project work for their M.Sc. students, which lay the foundation for research activity among the students.
- Availability of more than 50,000 books (including old & rare books) in the library and about 35 Journal titles and INFLIBNET (access to online journals) across many fields provide the students the opportunity of having a treasure of knowledge.

- \* Recently the main academic building of the college has been connected with Wi-Fi network.
- ❖ Many faculty members of different academic departments are also actively engaged in collaborative research programme with many leading institutions/organization.
- ❖ During the period 2011-2016, the total number of publications by faculty members (serving this College) and students comprising papers published in peer and non-peer reviewed journals, monographs, chapter in books and books with or without ISSN/ISBN No. is about 120.
- ❖ The NSS wing of the college started functioning in 2011 and has been an active body ever since. The College has also organized workshops to promote awareness among the students regarding Thalassemia and performed blood screening.

#### CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Haldia Govt. College believes in the successful combination of the traditional and modern. In course of time, the college has augmented its infrastructure and has embraced with open hands the modern technologies for upgradation of the learning resources. The following are the major highlights in this criterion related to infrastructure and learning resources:

- ❖ Haldia Govt. College is housed in a sprawling campus area of 19.44 acre with 12 academic Departments where, 07 science and 04 humanities and one self-financed vocational course/subject (TTM).
- ❖ The Officer-in-Charge works closely with administrative team comprising Co-ordinator IQAC, and Head of the Departments to offer effective leadership by setting values and participative decision-making process in co-ordinating the academic and administrative planning and implementation. The institution adopts quality management strategies in all academic and administrative aspects.
- ❖ Several annex buildings are allotted for Principal's quarter, Teachers' hostel, Boys' hostel, Girls' Hostel, staff quarters, and students' canteen.
- ❖ Infrastructural spaces are allotted to or other arrangements are made for different cells like IQAC, Exam Cell, Grievance Redressal Unit, Health Care Centre etc.
- ❖ The college library offers a rich collection of books. It houses many rare and out-of-print books and INFLIBNET facility has just been introduced. This Central Library is the nerve centre of learning at college
- ❖ The college offers connectivity of internet through ICT programme. There are laptops and desktop computers in the college and the number is ever increasing. These computers are constantly upgraded with latest versions. Some of the classrooms have been upgraded into smart classrooms. The access of internet is provided to all departments,

administrative office, library through broadband network and Wi-Fi service has just been introduced in the whole college. This has improved the network and communication across the campus as it has given reliable and fast connectivity.

- ❖ The college is well equipped with several laboratories with modern state of the art equipment in the science departments, computer and internet facility.
- ❖ Introduction of CCTV surveillance in the college campus.
- ❖ Career Counselling and Placement Cell are working together to promote students to think and plan their career. Our students have succeeded in getting jobs in State Administrative Services, Banking Services, Police and Defence, Schools, Colleges and Judiciary etc.
- ❖ Youth Festival and Social Gathering are organised every year to provide platform to talented students to gain confidence by performance.

The college has a website of its own <u>www.haldiagovtcollege.org.in</u>. The website is updated regularly. On-line admission process is conducted through this website.

#### CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The College comprises students from diverse geographical, lingual, cultural and economical backgrounds. Supporting students for overall development is the basic need of the day. Further, the students should be skilled, technologies enabled and have wisdom of harmonizing values and realities to survive and progress in this mundane world. This College bears with this mission and strives to achieve it sincerely and provides very good infrastructural and academic facilities to all its students. The major points in this regard are enumerated below:

- ❖ The College publishes an annual Academic Calendar consisting of detailed information regarding College activities.
- The college publishes a prospectus every year which is issued to the students seeking admission to the college. The prospectus contains extensive information about the college and its curriculum.
- ❖ Students are financially reinforced for their study from college, State Govt., Central Govt. and other agencies such half free and full free on students fees by college, SC/ST scholarship, bidi shramik stipend, Kanyashree Prakalpa, minorities scholarship, Meritcum-Means Scholarship etc.
- ❖ Students belonging to the SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker sections of the society are taken care of by the college beginning from admission into the college according to college, university and UGC reservation' rules & regulations.
- ❖ The college provides a healthy environment to the students through several welfare means such as cheap canteen, Grievance Redressal Cell, Career Counselling Cell and a fully functional Students' Section in the college office.
- ❖ The college has an active Anti-ragging Cell and an Anti-Ragging Squad to take prompt action in case of any untoward incidents on college premises.

- ❖ As a Co-educational institute, our college has constituted a committee on Gender sensitization and prevention of sexual harassment, although not a single case has been formally reported so far.
- ❖ Effective safety & security measures available in the college and in the boy's and girl's hostel for students and college assets.
- ❖ For medical assistance to students the Institution has its own arrangement for providing First Aid facility. In case of emergency, the institution opts for other medical facilities provided by the nearby medical centers.
- ❖ Awareness programmes such as rallies and seminars are organized by the institution to generate awareness among the students and teachers about fatal diseases like AIDS, Thalassemia, Dengue etc. on a regular basis by NSS unit. NSS unit of the college arranges for regular counseling and health checkup programmes for students.
- ❖ Career counselling sessions were organized during last three-four years to provide the students a scope for industry interactions and many students were placement in various work field. This cell is also planning for Career Counseling Workshops to motivate students towards civil service and social service.
- ❖ Students are take advantages from Departmental and Central Library wisely.
- ❖ The college inspires and provides necessary financial and logistical support for students participating in Sports activities (both Indoor & Outdoor) at the University/State/National level where they perform reasonably well.
- Students are encouraged always to participate in co-curricular activities to write in wall magazines, departmental magazines, college annual magazines time to time.
- ❖ Departmental teachers also groom their students regarding competitive examinations like NET/SET/JAM/GATE, School service Examination etc. Success rate of the students in these examinations speaks volumes about the efforts of the teachers.
- Remedial classes and tutorials are organized by every department for such slow learners. Bilingual explanation, revision of topics and practical sessions.
- \* Record keeping of student progression is done by means of personal contacts at the initiative of faculty members, social networking sites, alumni association, reunion arranged from time to time.
- ❖ The college has a distinguished list of alumni and a recognized Alumni Association which keeps close contact with the authority for the overall development of the college Soon the options for registration of Alumni members through the College website and integration of the portal with Facebook and other social media will be made available.
- ❖ The college has an elected Students' Union which actively participates and cooperate in organizing the various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such as programmes of Study Circle, Mock Parliament, various cultural programmes, indoor and outdoor game competitions, annual sports meet etc.

# CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

An educational institution which has a clearly identified vision and mission and is ably led by the clear sighted leaders is bound to achieve excellence. Administration is a vital part of an educational institution and Haldia Government College has always believed in progression through proper governance, leadership and management for a holistic development of the college. The major points in this regard are enumerated below:

- ❖ The college functions with the vision to build a young generation which can act as essential components in the process of cultural, socio-economic and environmental sustainable development as individuals, communities and a nation.
- ❖ It is the mission of the college to promote inclusive education and development amongst all economic sections of the society without gender-bias.
- ❖ The Principal is the key element in developing the organizational structure, formulating and implementing the strategy of development. It is his/her responsibility to ensure the operation of an efficient fiscal and human resource management system which will promote the best practices of the institution.
- ❖ Being a government college, this institution is administered directly by the Higher Education Department of the Government of West Bengal. All the appointments, confirmation, promotion, transfer of Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff are controlled by the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal.
- ❖ The Principal, as per discussion and resolutions adopted by different recommending bodies, including the Governing Body recommends and forwards the respective matter for approval of the Education Directorate and Higher Education Department. Once the proposal is approved, the execution of work is done with the assistance of all concerned under the supervision of the Principal.
- ❖ To implement the institutional strategic plans different academic and administrative committees and sub-committees are constituted.
- ❖ Through the Students' Union, the college regularly receives the report regarding the fulfillment of all their academic needs as well as the welfare programmes like scholarship, free-studentship, health awareness etc.
- ❖ Many college teachers are members of the Post-Graduate and Under-Graduate Board of Studies of the Vidyasagar University.
- ❖ Purchase Committee operates the purchasing procedure and the Principal on discussion with the Departmental Heads, sets guidelines of fund distribution.
- ❖ The institution can neither accumulate capitation fees from the students (at the time of admission) to enrich its resources nor can it directly take any step to develop or even repair any infrastructural component. In spite of that, the college always tries to mobilize its internal resources for its betterment.
- ❖ Through its unit of Netaji Subhash Open University, the college helps a large section of the young generation of its locality to continue their study in different branches.

- ❖ The institution has a Grievance Redressal Cell and a Disciplinary Committee.
- ❖ The grants received by the college are regularly audited by the registered auditors and the Audit and Accounts Department of the Government of West Bengal. Detailed audit of all accounts are conducted every four years.
- ❖ The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a major role to ensure timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks of the institution.

#### CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

The Innovative measures and the Best Practices adopted by the college in the last four years are listed below:

- ❖ Monitoring the environmental balance within the campus through measures like organizing Tree Plantation programme, declaring the campus as No-Smoking and No-Plastic zones, organizing seminars on environmental issues etc. have been initiated.
- \* Regular student seminars and internal assessment in each department are held.
- ❖ The admission, the student affairs, the tendering, billing, the scholarship delivery system and several other important activities are largely paper free.
- Clean and filtered drinking water throughout the premises as well as Boys' and Girls' hostels have been provided.
- Primary importance is given to reduce the volume of chemical wastes generated in our laboratories.
- ❖ The College began subscribing to online library service INFLIBNET from the academic session 2016-17
- ❖ In 2015 PG courses in Geography and Chemistry were introduced.
- ❖ Postgraduate Distance Education Courses in subjects like Chemistry, Geography and Bengali are available.
- ❖ Approval of four new subjects (both honours and general course) namely History, Philosophy, Political Science and Sanskrit has been procured from Vidyasagar University. Necessary government approval is awaited.
- ❖ The College has implemented efficient waste disposal.
- \* Admission process is completely online.
- ❖ Digitalization of student database and NEFT transfer of scholarships have been achieved.
- ❖ The college has established Anti-ragging cell and Gender Sensitization Cell against Sexual Harassment.

#### **SWOC ANALYSIS**

#### **STRENGTHS:**

- ❖ Haldia Government College is the second oldest government college in the erstwhile undivided Midnapore district and the first government college in the present district of Purba Medinipur. It is the second government college under Vidyasagar University.A good number of students graduating from the college are established in different fields.
- ❖ The institution boasts of a multicultural, multilingual environment with its focus on upholding the ideal of secular education, cutting across borders of class and gender.
- ❖ The college plays a significant role in inclusive education by catering to the needs of education for the economically weaker sections of the society coming both from urban and rural backgrounds.
- ❖ There is an appreciable number of girl students and students from the backward communities in the college.
- ❖ As the college has general courses for the less meritorious students, it plays an important role in the process of universalization of education.
- ❖ Almost all departments can boast of students who are university rank-holders.
- ❖ Special classes like Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners and the college holds parent-teacher meetings on a regular basis.
- ❖ A group of dedicated, motivated and highly-qualified teachers help in maintaining the academic standard of the college.
- ❖ Research by the teaching staff has been the strength of the college for a long time. Lately, with the encouragement of UGC and the State Government, increasing emphasis is being laid on funded research and publication as discussed in the subsequent chapters. Research projects (major and minor) and peer-reviewed publications both in national and international journals are representing increasing contribution in higher academic field leading to healthy participation in the process of globalization of education.
- ❖ The Central Library offers a wide range of books on various subjects. The total number of books and journals in the central library is approximately 50,000. The college has a Rare Book section in which a number of rare books are available. The Library has INFLIBNET facilities. Each department has its own well-stocked Seminar Library.
- ❖ Participation of students in social work, extension activities, NSS-organized programmes instill among them a sense of moral and social responsibility leading to their holistic development as citizens of this country.
- ❖ The Career Counselling and Placement Cell operate actively, guiding students to explore various job opportunities and many students were placed in various work field.

- ❖ High speed broadband internet connection is in place. All Departments, the Principal's Office, the Library and the Students' Union are all connected through LAN.
- ❖ The college administration operates smoothly on the basis of a computerized office and software-equipped Accounts Section.
- ❖ The college has adopted an online admission system for the undergraduate and post-graduate admissions since 2015.
- ❖ The college offers hostel facilities to both male and female students separately at a nominal rate.
- ❖ The recently formed Alumni Association is actively engaged in guiding and providing valuable suggestions for the improvement of the college, including their significant academic and social activity and also providing donations for organizing seminars and extension activities.

#### **WEAKNESS:**

- Space constraint is one of the weaknesses of the college which limits the infrastructural extension in the present campus.
- ❖ Both the undergraduate courses and newly introduced postgraduate courses suffer from lack of sufficient space for classrooms and laboratories.
- The campus does not have a complete boundary wall.
- ❖ Although the college has separate hostels for girls and boys there is no permanent sanctioned post of hostel superintendent and security guard.
- ❖ Due to the space constraint, the college does not have large playgrounds or an auditorium.
- ❖ Although two postgraduate departments have started operating, the college has not been able to provide new laboratories. Transfer of teachers at times creates a shortage of manpower and sometimes disrupts the momentum.
- ❖ There is a severe dearth of non-teaching staff as well. Vacancies of non-teaching staff, laboratory assistants need to be filled up.
- ❖ As the institute is yet to have academic autonomy at the undergraduate level, its contribution in curriculum designing and modification remains limited.
- Further technological upgradation is required.

#### **OPPORTUNITIES:**

- ❖ Further expansion of postgraduate courses will benefit prospective students of the area as considerable demand exists for provision of opportunity for postgraduate studies. Vidyasagar University, located at a distance of 115 Km, is the main centre offering postgraduate and research facilities in the district. A few colleges have opened postgraduate courses at a smaller scale. Therefore sufficient opportunity as well as need exists for such expansion in this institute of higher education. Proposals for new postgraduate subjects have been forwarded to the higher authorities.
- ❖ Proposals for introduction of both Honours and General courses in subjects like Sanskrit, Philosophy, Political Science, and History have already been forwarded to Vidyasagar University. The university has also approved the General courses.
- ❖ Every year the students of the college participate in inter-college sports and athletics meets. They also participate in inter-college competitions organized by Vidyasagar University.
- ❖ The Library needs more reorganization and the process of computerization needs to be completed at the earliest. It has approximately 50,000 books. Simultaneously bar coding has to be introduced.
- ❖ Opportunities exist for enhancing the security and communication system in the campus. Already CCTV and intercom facilities have been installed which will be further expanded.
- ❖ A new and large auditorium is required for seminars, symposia and cultural activities.

#### **CHALLENGES:**

- \* To motivate the students for acquiring the ability to read, write and understand English.
- ❖ The academic performance of the students is good, yet there remains further scope of improvement. The challenge is to retain and enhance the quality and performance of the students.
- ❖ Being a government college, the institution does not have scope of filling up vacancies in teaching and non-teaching posts. Thus, the challenge is to keep up the standard of imparting education with less than adequate manpower.
- ❖ The pace of upgrading infrastructure is not proportionate with the annual increase in student intake as directed by the university.
- ❖ The capacity of hostels is inadequate for the huge number of applicants.
- ❖ The Teachers' Hostel, too, in in urgent need of maintenance. But owing to paucity of funds this task too remains unfinished



The college has provision for regular post graduate teaching in Geography and Chemistry. The college has a study centre for Netaji Subhash Open University, West Bengal which offers different undergraduate, postgraduate and diploma courses.
- ❖ A very fruitful, popular and vibrant professional course is the Tourism and Travel Management course offered by the college, which yields tremendous career opportunities for students.
- ❖ Students attend classes, held regularly by the college and follow strict attendance rules. They actively participate in class discussions and interact with the faculty.
- ❖ There is continuous internal assessment of students' performance. According to university regulations, final examination results include internal assessment examinations marks.
- ❖ Periodic class tests are held to assess the performance of the students and enable them to improve their performance.
- ❖ Field tours are organised by the Geography, Anthropology and Bengali departments as part of their curriculum.
- ❖ Students are provided text and reference books from the seminar libraries of the respective departments in addition to the central library. The students are also provided different reference e-books, soft and hard copies of relevant articles of reputed and referred journals in the different departments of the college.
- Seminars and workshops are organised regularly to create interest of the students in academic exercises.
- ❖ Students contribute to wall magazines on a regular basis.
- ❖ Film shows and ethnographic documentary movies are held by English, Anthropology and other departments to complement classroom teaching.
- **!** Using power point presentation is another teaching aid used by most departments.
- ❖ Interdepartmental invited lectures are organized by different departments of the college.
- ❖ Students are encouraged and motivated by the faculty to arrange and participate in group discussions, debates, and interactive sessions on different topics of the syllabi in front of the teachers and other students of the concerned department.

# 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/ or the Institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Some teachers of the college are members of the University Board of Studies and are kept constantly updated about the latest developments of the university plans. Periodic visits to the University ensure regular interaction between the college and its affiliating University. Almost all the teachers of the college are involved by the University in paper evaluation; some of them are involved in question paper setting and moderation. The college is informed about changes in the syllabus or system of evaluation by the University through workshops and meetings.

# 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

As members of the University Board of Studies the college teachers offer valuable suggestions at college meetings for proper implementation of the syllabus. The college meticulously follows the teaching guidelines of the University and advises students to follow the texts prescribed by the University. They are also advised to do reference work in the library and access the internet as and when required.

### 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

Students of the Chemistry and Geography departments are involved in internships and training programmes arranged by different industries. The faculty participates in workshops and training courses organized by the University.

#### **TTM Department**:

As per exiting guideline of the University each student is required to undertake at least 3 months of practical training in tourism enterprise (e.g. Travel Agency, Tour Operation Unit, Hotel, Transportation Unit, etc). Students also visit and undertake training under Ministry of Tourism, Government of West Bengal and students also attend workshops and seminar time to time.

Students from TTM department undergo 45 days industrial training at different travel industries/agency for course work/field work.

Some travel agencies which student provide these types of training programme are i) Weekly Trip Online Travel Agency, Bangalore; ii) Sita Online Travel Agency (SOTC), Kolkata.

#### **Chemistry:**

The postgraduate students of department of chemistry visit industrial houses as part of their curriculum.

#### Geography:

The postgraduate students from department of geography visit different urban areas, municipal bodies, rural development organizations and research institutes in order to gain hand to hand knowledge and experience. Field visits are mandatory as per the postgraduate curriculum.

### 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff

members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stake holder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

- ❖ The University Board of Studies incorporates a number of teachers from the college as members. Their interaction with the University is the means by which feedback and suggestions are exchanged.
- ❖ Different faculty members of departments of Geography, Education, Anthropology, English, Statistics, Sociology and TTM act as BOS member of UG courses of Vidyasagar University.
- ❖ In postgraduate courses of Chemistry and Geography several departmental faculty members act as BOS members time to time.
- ❖ All academic departments take students' feedback and the BOS members convey the same to university during the meetings.

# 1.1.7. Does the Institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating University) -by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed

As the college has no academic autonomy, it is at present not possible to develop independent curriculum for any course.

Post Graduate departments set semester question papers through proper moderation under the guidance of the BOS.

The University holds examinations annually for undergraduate students. The college analyses the results and explores ways and means to improve the performance of the students. Meetings with parents are held to discuss matters. Extra guidance is offered to students who need help. Departmental meetings are held to discuss matters regarding better performance of students.


The college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University and does not enjoy the freedom to offer any other course, other than those offered by the University.

The college does not offer any such programme at present.



At the UG level, the college has Core options in English, Bengali, Education and Sociology in Arts. In Science, the Core options are Mathematics, Statistics, Physics,

Chemistry, Geography, Anthropology and Economics. Students may opt for these subjects as Elective options also. Physical Education is also there as an Elective option. General Degree courses in Arts and Science are also provided.



Apart from the regular UG programme the college has:

Regular Postgraduate courses: At the Postgraduate level, Postgraduate courses are offered in Geography and Chemistry subject under

- 1. M.A. in Bengali

NSOU: The college has a study centre of Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU). The following subjects are taught in this study centre.

UG Courses: Bengali, English, History, Public Administration, Zoology, Geography, Chemistry.

Post Graduate Courses: Bengali, English, History, Pol. Science, Public Administration, MSW, M.Com, Mathematics, Master in Library Science (MLIS)

1 year Diploma Courses: English language teaching, Library science (BLIS), Journalism and Mass Communication.

# 1.2.4. Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The college has self financed Tourism and Travel Management vocational course. This is a three years undergraduate vocational course under Vidyasagar University curriculum with 1+1+1 tier examination system. The students can take this course after completing 10+2. The annual fee of this course is Rs. 7000/- per annum. Currently the college has two guest faculty in this department with Post Graduate Degree and they are getting Rs. 10000/- per month as honorarium.

# 1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Tourism and Travel Management course offered by the college is a skill oriented programme and provides opportunities for successful career options.

# 1.2.6. Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Under the existing system, there is no scope of combining face-to-face with distance mode of learning, although both of these are approved by our affiliating university.

#### 1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

## 1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The institution strives to maintain high standards of academic achievement. By arranging regular workshops, seminars and invited lectures through which students are made aware of the latest developments in research in various subjects. They feel free to interact with experts in different subjects to broaden their perspective and thereby do justice to the goals and objectives of the institution.

## 1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college does not enjoy the freedom to redesign the university curriculum. The college tries to ensure that students have a proper understanding and perception of the prescribed syllabus and texts to enable them to grasp the intricacies of the subject. They are encouraged to think independently and strengthen their critical faculty.

## 1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The college gives special attention to acquaint the students with matters related to Gender, Climate Change, Human Rights and Environmental Education.

- ❖ Gender is an important component in the syllabi of subjects like English, Bengali and Sociology. The college has a Women's Cell and a Gender Sensitization Cell in the activities of which both students and teachers play important roles.
- ❖ Environmental Education is a compulsory subject. Students have to qualify in the subject to get their Bachelor's Degree. From the current academic session the students are also required to submit an environmental project report.
- ❖ Students of the Geography department conduct experiments on issues of Weather Change. During field survey the students of the Geography department collect temperature, rainfall and other climatic data to analyse climatic characteristics. After analysis, they use the data to give some recommendations to cope with the changing climate in an area.

## 1.3.4. What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

It is the endeavour of the college to ensure that the students strive to maintain the highest standards of morality. Ideals of value education are imparted to them through socially relevant workshops, lectures and seminars.

❖ As part of their NSS programme activities, they organize and take part in various social initiatives

- ❖ The college has started a very active NCC wing in the year 2016. Socially relevant activities are undertaken by the NCC cadets. The NCC 55 Bengal Batallion of Tamluk organised a CATC Camp in the college premises from the 12th to the 21st of February, 2017 and conducted NCC 'C' Certificate examinations during that period.
- ❖ The eligible cadets of the college participated in the 'B' Certificate examinations of the NCC.
- ❖ College students took part in the 'Safe Drive Safe Life' initiative of the Government of West Bengal. Few students of this college won prizes in this initiative.

### 1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Teachers play an important role in seeking regular feedback from students and strive to accommodate their demands within the academic and co curricular activities of the college. Parent-Teacher meetings are held regularly to help the students and the suggestions of the stakeholders are taken account of and applied suitably. Students are encouraged to interact formally and informally with the faculty. As per their requirements, teaching and learning aids like seminars, workshops and film shows are regularly held by the departments. The Board of Studies members of the college interact regularly with the University to keep students updated with the changes in syllabus and other academic matters.

### 1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The teachers are vigilant to the requirements of the students and monitor the various enrichment programs of the college. The Governing Body and the IQAC cell provide support and guidance and evaluate the quality of enrichment programmes. There is an active Grievance Redressal Cell in the college. The NSS cell organizes various social activities as enrichment programmes.

### 1.4 Feedback System

### 1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Being an affiliated College, the Institute does not have the privilege to design its own curriculum. The syllabus and curriculum for under graduate and post graduate courses are designed by respective Board of Studies as appointed by Vidyasagar University and approved by the Academic Council of the University. However, some of the faculty of the college are members of Board of Studies, and play active part in the modification and framing of the syllabus.

## 1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

There is a formal feedback system which is needed to obtain student feedback on different issues related to curriculum content and design. Formal student feedback is taken from the collegiate students only.

Feedback regarding other issues, particularly regarding introduction of new programmes are presented in the form of recommendations to the Governing Body, the highest policy-making body, which takes a final decision on the issues taking all related matters into consideration.

## 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/ programmes?

- Regular Post Graduate courses have been introduced in the departments of Geography and Chemistry from the year 2015.
- ❖ Post Graduate courses under the Distance Education Programme in the subjects of Geography, Chemistry and Bengali have been continuing from the year 2012.
- ❖ The college has obtained permission from Vidyasagar University to start Honours and General courses in Political Science, History, Sanskrit and Philosophy. However government permission is still pending.

### Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

Smart classrooms have been established in Department of Geography and in Department of Chemistry. Interactive teaching learning procedure like audio-visual mode, overhead projector, LCD projector, laptop, Flow charts, models, science laboratories, modern equipments, computers with internet connections are provided.

Seminars, Workshops, Guest Lectures, Symposiums, Quiz, Debate, and Cultural Programmes are regularly organized for over all development and knowledge sharing.

Central library and departmental seminar library facility has also been created. Other active parts are UGC sponsored Career counselling and Placement cell, Grievance Cell, Anti Ragging cell, Gender Sensitivity Against Sexual Harassment Cell, Equal Opportunities Cell and Women's Cell.

Keeping the recommendations of the NAAC peer team in mind the following initiatives were taken up by the institution for curriculum enrichment:

- ❖ English and Bengali department jointly conducted several special lectures for introducing a comparative study between the English and Bengali literature.
- \* Remedial classes have also been extended to all subjects without financial assistance from UGC. Departmental faculty members take the initiatives for extending remedial classes for the slow learners.
- ❖ Alumni activities have been formalized. Feedback from Parent-teacher meeting and Alumni-meeting are given due consideration.

## CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

## 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- ❖ An advertisement for admission in our college is published in some local newspaper and local cable TV channel.
- ❖ Publicity and transparency are maintained also through extensive use of the college website. The website is regularly updated.
- ❖ All information including admission procedure, infrastructure, fee, various activities of the college etc, are uploaded regularly in the website.
- ❖ These are also put up in the college notice board.
- ❖ The college also publishes its prospectus annually which includes criteria for admission in various subjects. It is a complete corpus of all information on the admission process and is designed as a helpful guide for all applicants.
- ❖ Transparency is ensured by the introduction of online admissions since 2015 − 16. The college gives contract to an organisation who effectively manages everything from application process to publication of merit lists.
- ❖ The office is also equipped to handle the online admission process. All financial transactions are done through a nationalized bank.
- ❖ Needless to mention, merit is the sole criterion for admission. Counselling is done on the basis of the provisional merit list published in the website.
- ❖ The whole admission process is conducted by the Admission Sub-committee nominated by the Teacher's Council which is generally a combination of senior teachers and newly appointed young teachers. The Admission Sub-committee also includes representatives from the Students' Union.
- ❖ Students are provided a unique identity card after admission.

# 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other)to various programmes of the Institution.

At the undergraduate level, admission is conducted solely based on merit. Students are admitted on the basis of marks obtained in the last qualifying examination, i.e. 10+2 or equivalent. The eligibility criteria for admission to various courses are as follows:

### **Honours degree course:**

Qualifying Higher Secondary or equivalent examination with minimum 45% marks in aggregate (to be calculated by adding the marks obtained in best five subjects excluding Environmental Studies).

or,

50% marks in subject or related subject.

### **General degree course:**

Pass marks in at least five subjects in Higher Secondary or equivalent examination.

#### Other important information

- ❖ Any candidate seeking admission to a course in laboratory based subjects must have obtained pass marks in those subjects / relevant subjects at the Higher Secondary level.
- ❖ In addition to the above any candidate seeking admission to Honours course in Physics, Mathematics or Statistics must have passed in Mathematics in Higher Secondary or equivalent examination.
- ❖ Any candidate seeking admission to Honours courses in Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Education or Sociology and not having these subjects at H.S. or equivalent level, must have any one of the relevant subjects in his / her Higher Secondary or equivalent course. The relevant subjects are
  - i. Anthropology: Any subject combination except commerce (preference will be given to students with Biology in H.S. course)
  - ii. Economics: Any subject combination (preference will be given to students with Maths /Business Maths / Statistics in H. S. Course)
- iii. Education: History
- iv. Sociology: Political Science/ History

To take Physical Education as general subject students have to go through a physical fitness test which is conducted by the department of Physical education.

Students are admitted on the basis of the merit scores. The departments have the autonomy to decide the formula for computation of merit score. Usually, 10 % of aggregate of best five subjects along with marks obtained in the subject applied for is considered to calculate the merit score. Admission is carried out strictly following the reservation rules for SC, ST, OBC and physically disabled students.

For the twin PG courses (Geography and Chemistry), admission tests are conducted in a limited manner. 60% of the PG seats are reserved for students of the home university (VU) and the remaining 40% seats are open to graduates of all universities, including the home university. The 60% seats are filled strictly on the basis of marks obtained in the Honours subject. For the 40% seats, results of admission tests and merit are considered to prepare merit list. The admission test is conducted by the respective departments under the supervision of the Controller of

Examinations, Haldia Government College. The questions are all of multiple-choice type following the model of UGC's NET examination.

# 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The final results of 2016 are compared with other three colleges under Vidyasagar University within the Purba Medinipur district.





2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

### Yes there is such a mechanism in place.

• The Admission committee maintains a strict vigil on the admission process and conducts regular supervision on all its aspects.

- The administration, with the help of the college office, also monitors student profiles all the time with the intention of improving academic standards.
- Meetings are held frequently to ensure that the framed policy is in consonance with the criteria laid down by the affiliating university as well as with the government norms.
- Suggestions and recommendations from all heads of the departments and other stakeholders are considered to review the modus operandi methodically. Student profiles are reviewed by the departments and duly communicated to the Admission Committee for counselling. However, efforts are made to not disturb the mandate for inclusive education.

# 2.1.5. Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

**SC/ST**: The reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal is followed with respect to admission of students of the SC and ST categories which is 22 percent and 6 percent for SCs and STs respectively.

**OBC**: In 2014 the new policy of the Government of West Bengal is to increase the number of seats for OBC to 17 % over a period of 6 years keeping the total number of seats (in General quota) intact.

**Women**: The college is a co-educational institution and hence equal stress is given to encourage higher education for women. However, no separate reservation policy for women exists. The "Kanyashree Prakalpa", a grant disbursed by the Government of West Bengal for unmarried women students is operating in the college.

**Differently-abled students**: The reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal is followed here too. The college gives opportunity to disabled students both with regard to academic and infrastructural facilities, if admitted.


Economically weaker sections: The college has the Students' Welfare and Students' Union Subcommittee, the Equal Opportunity Cell and the Students' Counselling Subcommittee (under the Teachers' Council) which are in charge of addressing the needs and scopes of economically weaker students. They also try to disseminate information as well as grants relating to various scholarships of the Government of West Bengal and the Government of India to the students making them aware of such stipends. Various private and corporate house scholarships are also given to needy but meritorious students especially from economically weaker sections.

Minority Communities: The college regularly makes available various government funds / scholarships and stipends to the students of the minority community. The college strictly follows the government's reservation policy for SC / ST and OBC (Category A & Category B) and adheres to the government norms. Although there is no provision for waiving of any fees at the time of admission for needy students yet the fees are highly subsidized as any comparative study with private institutions of similar standard will reveal. Coaching for NET or SET is organized for S.C., S.T., minority and O.B.C. students of the college by the two postgraduate departments of Chemistry and Geography.

### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

## 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college provides all forms of academic and administrative support to the differently-abled students as far as possible both in the context of government rules and ergonomical compliance whenever needed. Teachers provide special care for their academic improvement and generation of interest.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. Haldia Govt. College makes efforst to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme in two different ways. First, from the filled in application form for admission, information on the background of the students is sorted on both academic and personal ground. Prima facie information in terms of knowledge and skills of the students is acquired in this regard. Further, at the time of admission, both the Counselling Desk comprising of

departmental teachers (where the student is to be admitted) as well as Students' Help Desk address the need of applicants and also answer their queries.

# 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

**Bridging**- For bridging purposes, bilingual explanation strategies are adopted in classroom lectures and discussions. Tutorial classes are arranged in all the departments. Faculty members of the department sit with students and orient them towards advanced learning.

**Remedial**- Academically weak students are identified secretly and special remedial classes are held in various subjects to help them.

**Add-on & Enrichment**- The teachers take special care to identify areas of weakness in students. To address this they procure relevant books in the seminar libraries for their benefit with the help of funds supplied by the government.

All departments encourage students to participate in seminars, workshops etc. organized either centrally or departmentally in the college. Informal student-seminars are also held in classrooms where they are asked to make presentations and participate in discussion sessions.

## 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc?

Gender – Haldia Government College is a co-educational institution which provides equal opportunity to the female students and the third gender. Separate Common Room for female students is exclusively maintained in the institution. A separate Disciplinary committee namely, Gender Sensitization Cell against Sexual Harassment in match with BISAKHA guidelines is maintained to provide the needs of women. The college also has a Women's Cell and an Equal Opportunity Cell which organizes seminasr in collaboration with National Service Scheme in regular manner. The Women's Cell organizes different programmes to celebrate Women's day every year.

**Inclusive Representation**- The college being a government college supports inclusive education making no discrimination on the basis of religion, caste, ethnicity, region, language, social status etc. Further, the institution follows the reservation rules as per Government norms for SC's, ST's, OBC - A & OBC - B. The college has a separate subcommittee to monitor the above work.

**Environment-friendliness**- The two NSS units of the college take regular initiatives to promote environment-friendliness among students. To this end they organize activities like tree-plantations, campus cleaning drives etc. Moreover, all undergraduate third year students of the college have to prepare a project or carry out

field-work on environmental issues as part of the compulsory **Environmental Studies** curriculum of Vidyasagar University.

**Energy conservation**: Conservation of Energy is one of the primary areas of concern for Haldia Government College. The following measures are taken within the institution's premises to curtail wastage of energy and maintain optimum conservation. Sustenance of nature is the key concern for the institution in this regard. Fans and lights are turned off when the students are not around, and use of sunlight is maximized wherever possible. Doors and windows have tight seals and are closed when the air-conditioners are running. Computers, UPS, printers and copiers are turned off at the end of the day to avoid wastage of energy. Equipments are monitored and serviced at regular intervals for proper operation.

**Efforts for Carbon neutrality**: Haldia Government College, over the years, has tried to maintain carbon neutrality through a number of measures. Giving more importance to the greenery and plantation programme within the college promise for more supply of oxygen and reduction of gaseous form of carbon. The institution also boasts of a vast stretch of open land.

The college is situated in a busy industrial area and Haldia Dock complex is near the college. Also, NH-41 is just beside the college which remains very busy from day to night. This implies that the air here is not free from high levels of pollution. The emissions from industrial hubs as well as automobile exhausts contribute to the pollution. Knowing this the students of the college under the aegis of National Service Scheme and National Cadet Corps take a lot of initiative to plant trees, thus contributing to the reduction of carbon density in the atmosphere.

The personal vehicles used by the staff members conform to state defined pollution rules and match with Euro III and Euro IV specifications to reduce carbon emission.

**Plantation**: Plantation programmes within the college premise programme are held on a regular basis which is an important instrument for environment consciousness. Moreover, the gardener of the college effectively maintains the college garden which includes planting of new flower plants.

## 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The college efficiently identifies and supports the needs of the advanced learners in a number of ways which are as follows:

- The Central Library as well as Seminar Libraries in all the departments in the college provide text and reference Books of different specialized areas as well as journals of both international and national publishing houses.
- All the science departments has got excellent laboratory facilities to provide good experimental infrastructure to satisfy the needs of the advanced learners.

- Internet facilities are available in the different departments for providing soft copies of different types of advanced academic resources to the advanced learners.
- Once the advanced learners are identified, they are encouraged to take part in different workshops and short term skill enhancement courses.
- Departmental teachers spend time to help the advanced learners even beyond college hours.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
  - The college carries out analysis of academic performance through conduct of Unit tests. The Unit Tests are conducted twice a year which also a part of University Curriculum.
  - Further, different departments regularly organise class tests to assess the progress of the students in their academics. Class tests are often conducted as surprise test to test whether the students are ready for the final university examinations.
  - Apart from this, regularity of the students is monitored frequently to identify the absentee students.
  - These steps are followed up by a number of deeds so as to reduce the risk of drop out particularly from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.
  - The teachers of the institution advise and guide the students for betterment as well as counsel those who are weak and fail to cope with the academic standard of the college. Results are prepared centrally but with close dialogue conducted with departments so that the weaknesses of individual students are tackled in a need-based manner.
  - The departments tend to keep track of the absentee students and try to find the cause of absence.
  - Every now and then they are kept in touch over phone and motivations are provided for being present in the class and academic improvement.
  - The departments also organize parent-teacher meetings every year to discuss about strength and weakness of the students.

### 2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The schedules mentioned here are taken up as agenda for discussion in every meeting of the Teachers' Council and especially in the meeting held at the beginning of the academic session.

The **Academic Subcommittee** of the Teachers' Council prepares a detailed Academic Calendar at the beginning of the session. It is circulated among all departments of the college.

The individual departments, through departmental meetings, set up the teaching assignments of each teacher and the students are subsequently notified.

The Academic Subcommittee also prepares the master routine for the entire college at the beginning of the session. The individual departments then frame their individual routines which are displayed on the notice boards for everyone to see.

The **evaluation process** is structured by Vidyasagar University and sent to the college, which is followed by all departments of the college. The detailed breakup of marks, question pattern, probable date of examination etc. is communicated to the students at the beginning of the academic session. Any change in the pattern is intimated well in advance.

Two Internal Assessments per year for Honours students and one per year for students of the General course are held for each batch as per directive of the University. Apart from these separate class-tests (in written and oral form) are also conducted by the departments.

In some departments students are required to carry out a project in their Final Year of study as part of the University curriculum. They are evaluated internally by the College teachers and externally by University experts.

The postgraduate departments evaluate their students through semester examinations and presentation of Term Papers in seminars.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- ❖ A strict vigilance over attendance of students and teachers is maintained round the year.
- ❖ The syllabus is meticulously covered and students' grasp over all its areas is ascertained through periodical assessments.
- ❖ Five Internal Assessments per year are held for each batch as per directive of the University. Apart from these class-tests (in written and oral form) are also conducted by the departments.
- Regular monitoring of college infrastructure is carried out.
- ❖ Constant attention is directed towards effective upgradation of knowledge base of all teaching staff by ascertaining participation in Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Research, Seminars and Workshops etc.
- ❖ Departments are encouraged to regularly hold Remedial as well as Tutorial classes to address the specific needs of weaker sections of students.
- ❖ Departments are instructed to organize Special lectures and Seminars to provide inspiration and enhance knowledge to students.
- ❖ Departments are also encouraged to hold student seminars.

❖ Purchase of books and equipment for all Departments as well as the Central Library is monitored on a regular basis.

## 2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- ❖ The teachers are committed to giving individual attention to students as far as possible. Practices like remedial coaching for students belonging to reserved categories are regularly carried out. Special Tutorial classes are held to encourage the advanced learners.
- Apart from the usual 'chalk and talk' method other teaching aids like audio-visual methods are employed.
- ❖ Advanced software is used whenever required.
- ❖ Students are encouraged to take part in special student-seminars held in the departments to boost their confidence.
- ❖ Student performance in the internal tests and class tests are regularly monitored.
- ❖ Students are guided in a one to one basis towards implementation of projects that are a part of the University syllabus.
- ❖ Students are given individual guidance when they are taken out for field work/excursions in subjects like Geography, Bengali and Anthropology.
- ❖ All disciplines are geared towards providing not just book-based curricular expertise but also an all-round education with meaningful real life orientation.
- ❖ Constant monitoring of students' learning is also done regularly through classroom interactions as well as personal meetings outside classrooms.
- ❖ The institution publishes its updated brochure every year at the beginning of the academic session which provides an overview of the college. The college website provides necessary details. Academic Calendar is also provided to the students to communicate the year-long schedule of the institution. Some of the salient features communicated to the students through these means are:
- Norms of admission/ courses offered at UG/PG level and Faculty list.
- Code of Conduct for the students.
- ❖ Hostel Accommodation: Its Rules & Guidelines.
- Stipend/award and prizes for the students
- ❖ Assessment system through internal examinations
- ❖ Seminars & Workshops that are organized by all departments regularly.
- Career-oriented seminars
- Remedial and Tutorial classes that are taken to support the students

Apart from these

- ❖ A fully functional **Career Counselling and Placement Cell** is operational in the college for providing valuable guidance to students regarding their career aspirations.
- ❖ The Gender Sensitization Committee Against Sexual Harassment of the college serves to disseminate knowledge relating to gender equality and discrimination among students as well as staff. Grievance redressal is also handled by the cell.
- ❖ A fully operational **Anti-ragging subcommittee** functions in the college.
- ❖ Participation of students in university, district and state level competitions ensured through the Physical Education Department.
- ❖ Maintenance of strict discipline, food-quality, hygiene and academic environment in boys' and girls' hostels of the college are maintained through the relevant subcommittees under the Teachers' Council.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Critical thinking ability is the foremost agenda of teaching-learning in this college. It is what is always present in the minds of the teachers. That is the most important rationale of higher education. Creativity and the scientific temper are attributes that invariably accompany critical thinking. These are the ways in which the college attempts that:

- ❖ Students are encouraged to ask questions and advance their opinions within the classrooms to make the teaching-learning process interactive.
- ❖ The college regularly arranges seminars and invitational lectures and workshops in various disciplines. The students and teachers of all departments are encouraged to participate in these.
- ❖ Students' seminars are held in which students are encouraged to make presentations and take part critically in the discussions.
- ❖ Various awareness programmes like seminars on child rights, AIDS awareness, Thalassemia Detection Camps, gender sensitivity workshops, equal opportunity for all, women's rights etc. also help the cause.

# 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? eg. Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Under the National Mission on Education through ICT (NMEICT), funded by the Ministry of Human Resources Development, Government of India, provision for high speed broadband internet through both wireless and wired medium has been created in all the Departments, Library and College Office. A separate local area network (LAN)

has been set up as well, interconnecting physically distant points of various Departments. The college authority fully appreciates the opportunities that can emanate from internet access and is committed to remove all barriers in this regard.

- ❖ The IQAC is considering the options for integrating the virtual class lectures available through NPTEL programme and devising ways to incorporate the same into conventional classroom teaching. For this purpose, physical infrastructures are being augmented, such as creation of e-classrooms, improving broadband internet speed etc.
- Following technology enabled facilities are available for effective teaching:
- Use of LCD projectors.
- ❖ Use of internet and audio-visual medium like films.
- ❖ Use of software such as QGIS, Remote sensing GIS software Geomatica, Google Earth, and Corel Draw by Dept. of Geography.
- ❖ The Library has INFLIBNET facility, a portal through which the teachers and students can have access to useful journals.

## 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The college is always engaged in a constant endeavor to expose students and faculty to advanced levels of knowledge and skills. For this seminars / workshops and lectures / talks are frequent occurrences here. These are also made interactive to facilitate quick blending of the knowledge acquired.

Blended Learning in the form of interdisciplinary exchange happens between Geography and Statistics, Physics and Physical Chemistry, Sociology and Bengali, Bengali and English etc. Expert lectures are arranged particularly at postgraduate levels in the disciplines offering the degree.

Further, the faculties on a regular basis participate in Refresher Courses and Orientation programmes conducted by different Academic Staff Colleges across the country.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring / academic advice) provided to students?

Round the year in all the individual departments of the college guidance is made available for students. It begins on the very first day of the session when freshers are briefed on how and when they should approach the teachers as well as seniors for any form of support. Academic counseling is always on. It takes place everyday inside the classrooms as well as outside. Students are guided both collectively and individually on various aspects relating to studies and examinations. But this is not all. The teachers are also keen to develop personal rapport with the students and are available for any kind of emotional support.

The college has all the following statutory subcommittees under the supervision of the Teachers' Council:

- Grievance Cell
- ❖ Women's Cell
- Anti-ragging Subcommittee

All these subcommittees and cells are always working under the aegis of the Teachers' Council to maintain the ideal student-friendly environment within the college premises. Apart from that the teachers of the college have regular interaction with the students in a humane way to make them feel at home and pursue their studies happily.

# 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college administration has been in a continuous process of encouraging and supporting the faculty in adopting new and innovative approaches to teaching students. Regular meetings are held to discuss, monitor and assess the efficacy as well as feasibility of the new approaches. During the last four years the following steps were taken:

- \* Round-the-clock high speed internet access with Wi-Fi connectivity was made available in all departments. This helped teachers in better preparation of teaching materials as well as in their daily preparations.
- ❖ Faculties of different departments have developed the practice of using Microsoft PowerPoint presentations as a teaching aid while delivering lectures.
- ❖ The departments of Geography and Chemistry have developed smart classrooms as a latest cutting-edge advancement in the method of teaching.
- ❖ Frequent seminars, symposia and workshops are held along with special lectures and talks by eminent academicians.
- Many departments also use film-shows and exhibition of paintings to supplement teaching.
- ❖ The postgraduate departments of Geography and Chemistry regularly arrange seminar presentations, project work and require students to submit dissertation reports which are evaluated in the presence of external examiners.
- ❖ Educational tours also play an important role in the curriculum. These are done with full sincerity and students are accompanied by teachers as well as non-teaching staff members.
- ❖ In addition to the aforesaid devices, ICT Tools such as photocopiers, scanners, printers etc. contribute to better learning process. GIS software, microscope with photographic attachment etc. also help the cause of innovative learning. Student feedback system also helps to nurture the development of the new teaching aids across the departments.

### 2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Haldia Government College has a rich library system that is constantly in use by the students. The central library houses approximately 37,611 books and approximately 380 copies of journals. The reading room can house approximately 60 people. There is constant internet access in the library. Apart from the central library, there are seminar libraries attached to all individual departments. Photocopying facility is also provided to the students on request.

The college is a subscriber of INFLIBNET NLIST database. It has also initiated necessary steps for automation of the library through KOHA software. The application for the disposal of fund for this purpose is now under active consideration of the government. The library has further planned to create a bibliographic database of its entire collection and thereafter aims at a thorough implementation of the proposal to convert all activities of the library into the digital format. More specifically, beginning with library membership all routine transactions and dissemination of information will be on a paperless basis.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Proper completion of curriculum within due time is always the foremost priority of the teachers in this institution. But, in doing so the teachers have to undergo a number of constraints and challenges. Situations often arise where numbers of teaching days are curtailed owing to reasons like co-curricular activities, students' election mechanism, changes incorporated in University academic calendar and so on. Further calamities both natural and socio-political tend to create challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. This being a government college the mechanism of in-service transfer of faculty also sometimes makes smooth completion of syllabus difficult. To overcome these constraints, the teachers often take extra classes outside the routine as well as sometimes during the vacation period.

### 2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning?

The monitoring of the teaching-learning process is done through a structured method:

- On a central level, the IQAC keeps a constant vigil on the academic processes of the College. It checks and keeps record of the functioning of the faculty and the students.
- ❖ Internal academic audits by the IQAC are a mechanism to supplement its monitoring.
- ❖ Teachers constantly monitor students' attendance through regular attendance records. Students' progress is also evaluated through class assessments and/or tests.
- ❖ If any student is found with poor attendance or appears disinterested in learning, then the teachers try to sort out the problem through counselling her/him.
- \* Regular Parent-teacher meetings are conducted to apprise the guardians about the academic affairs of the college and the progress of their wards.
- ❖ The Principal monitors the functioning of the departments by regularly checking the teachers' Daily Self Appraisals and conferring with HoDs on pertinent matters.
- ❖ All academic activities are decided through the Teachers' Council.
- ❖ The College also informs and involves the Students' Union and the Alumni to muster support to ensure optimum results from Teaching-Learning.

### 2.4 Teacher Quality

# 2.4.1: Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

As Haldia Government College is a government college, it doesn't enjoy any autonomy in the recruitment and retention of the permanent teachers. These teachers are appointed by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal as per the recommendation of Public Service Commission, West Bengal. The permanent teachers are transferred to different government colleges within the state as per the government orders issued by the Higher Education Department from time to time.

In earlier times, the college used to recruit the Part-time teachers. However, since 2010 the recruitment and retention of Part-time teachers are monitored by the government. The college, however, is empowered to recruit and retain eminent faculties as Guest Teachers in different PG departments. These recruitments, however, have to be approved by the government.

The number of sanctioned teaching posts in our college is 59. But presently we have 44 permanent teachers and 6 permanent part time (PTT) teachers approved by the state government working in the institution.

40 % of the recruited teachers have Ph.D. as the highest qualification.

50 % of the teachers have Ph.D. or M.Phil. as the highest qualification.

### (i) Teaching learning methods/approaches:

Faculty training programmes like Refresher Courses and Orientation programmes are attended by different teachers to improve their innovative teachings kills. Also Workshops, Summer and Winter Schools empower and enable the teachers for the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning. College grants them Duty Leave to provide encouragement.

#### (ii) Handling new curriculum:

Haldia Government College requests experienced teachers, active scientists and scholars to deliver special lectures as resource persons. Further, the college faculties participate actively in different seminars, workshops, refresher and orientation programmes *etc* to upgrade themselves to provide inputs to the students.

The postgraduate department of Chemistry has a course on green chemistry. This is due to an increasing demand of students and this will be very effective in connection with issues relating to the environment. Also this department deals with food preservative and food processing technique which will be useful for employment. The departments of Chemistry and Geography were eagerly equipped with some related tools and techniques to update themselves. Not only that, the departments have invited resource persons to exploit their expertise in the said fields of Chemistry, to accustom the teachers with new curricula of the said special papers for resolving both theoretical and practical problems, and have catered to the students according to their requirements.

- (iii) Content/knowledge management: The different departments in the College often undertake academic programmes in collaboration with other academic institutions to felicitate Content / Knowledge Management.
  - ❖ In 2016 the department of Chemistry organized a UGC sponsored national seminar on 'Recent Developments in Bio-active Molecules' in collaboration with Vivekananda Mission Mahavidyalaya, Rampur.
  - ❖ In September 2015 the Physical Education department of our college organized a UGC sponsored national seminar on 'Modern Physical Education, Sports and Globalization' in collaboration with Bhattar College, Dantan.
  - ❖ In March 2013 the Physical Education department of our college organized a UGC sponsored national seminar on 'Physical Education for Health, Wellness, Fitness and Social Integrity' in collaboration with Bhattar College, Dantan.

- ❖ In February 2013 the Geography department of our college organized a UGC sponsored national seminar in collaboration with the Sociology department of our college.
- (iv) Selection, development and use of enrichment materials: The college has undertaken different modalities for selection, development and use of enrichment materials. Some of these measures are mentioned hereby.
- ❖ Almost all the departments have access to internet facilities and accordingly teaching resources are prepared and distributed to the students by the faculties using this IT enabled service.
- ❖ Faculties of different departments developed Microsoft PowerPoint presentations as a teaching aid while delivering lectures.
- ❖ In addition to the aforesaid devices, ICT Tools such as photocopiers, scanners, printers etc. contribute to better learning process. GIS software, microscope with photographic attachment *etc*. also help the cause of innovative learning. Student feedback system also helps to nurture the development of the new teaching aids across the departments.
- (v) Assessment: (a) Through CAS for Promotion, (b) Assessment by the principal (confidential) to be submitted annually to the Directorate of Higher Education.

# 2.4.4. What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

Haldia Government College being a government college, the policies/systems to recharge teachers are mainly processed through the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal. Still the college aspires to nurture the research aptitude of the faculty. In context of Research grants, teachers have the opportunity to conduct Major and Minor Research projects funded by different bodies such as UGC, CSIR and ICSSR. Teachers have the opportunity to take study leave for Ph.D. or Post doctoral studies but that has to be sanctioned by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal in conformity with leave rules as per Service Conditions.

Dr. Samata Biswas of the department of English was granted one year's FDP in 2014 for the completion of her Ph.D. research.

As a measure for support for research and other academic publications, different departments of the college publish their own special publication editions where the teachers publish their research works. In context of specialized programmes/Industrial Engagements the Officer-in-charge gives ready permission or forwards the application for permission in an urgent basis for the faculties to undertake specialized programmes and industrial engagement as resource person or consultant.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The feedbacks of the outgoing students are taken on a prescribed form by the IQAC of the college as a way for evaluation of faculties. Students are encouraged to offer their opinion freely. Thorough analyses of the forms are then done by the members of

the IQAC and by the senior teachers in presence of the principal and accordingly measures are taken. In addition to that in our college parent teacher meetings are held on a regular basis and any suggestion or particularly any criticism is taken into account from a very positive angle and efforts are then made to improve the teaching-learning quality for the next academic session.

Evaluation of teachers has been done by the  $3^{\rm rd}$  Year students since 2011 - 2012 after their final internal assessment was over, where they could freely assess the performance of teachers of respective departments collectively. Only regular students (with 75% attendance) are allowed to do the evaluation. The feedback is analyzed by the principal and communicated to the teachers for introspection and improvement of the teaching process.

### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

## 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The institution ensures that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes through a number of methods like Institutional Notification, Teachers' Council meetings, Departmental Faculties meeting, Academic Calendars, Teacher-students interactions and the Parent Teachers Meetings all of which happens at regular intervals.

## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Haldia Government College is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Medinipur. There are two levels of teaching programme in the institution. These are:

- Postgraduate level (regular and distance modes)
- Undergraduate level (Honours and General courses)

In the postgraduate level, the departments operate in semester system (1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4<sup>th</sup> over 2 year time span). Two subjects are offered in postgraduation which are Chemistry and Geography.

As per the guidelines of the university, the college has adopted the 1+1+1 method of evaluation for the undergraduate course, instead of the earlier 2+1 method. The evaluation process constitutes of theory and practical examinations at the end of each year conducted by the university in a centralized way. All the Honours subjects have 800 marks distributed over 3 years' time and the General subjects have 300 marks distributed over 2 years' time.

The pattern of questions varies from subject to subject according to their individual requirements.

The evaluation of practical examinations is conducted through laboratory experiments, field reports, project works; computer based practical tasks, instrumental survey techniques and viva voce. External examiners are appointed by the university for the purpose.

The university has also set rules for the conduct of Internal Assessments every year. Accordingly, the college holds 2 (two) tests every year for Honours students and 1 (one) every year for General students. These tests consist of papers having 10 marks. There are five questions in every paper having 2 marks each. These Internal Assessments contribute 10% of a student's marks to the final performance in the university examinations. (Each paper in the final examinations has 90 marks.)

The assessment system of the university at the undergraduate level as well as the postgraduate programmes in the college enables the students to compete and appear in entrance examinations of reputed international and national institutes of higher learning for postgraduate studies, NET / SET examinations, Ph.D. degrees and other service related public examinations conducted by bodies like UPSC, State PSC etc.

As aforesaid, for the postgraduate programmes, the institution runs the two year Master's course through a semester system divided into four semesters (1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th), each of six months' duration. The evaluation reforms consist of the following:

An examination at the end of six months marking the completion of the Semester. Continuous laboratory experiments/assignments as mode of regular evaluation. Presentation of Term Papers through seminars, Preparation of Projects through collection and analysis of molecules and others specimens as and what is relevant for the individual departments. Preparation of a dissertation paper at the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4th semesters based on the projects allotted to individual students. They are also required to make Powerpoint presentations on relevant research topics. This enables the students to appear in NET, SLET, GATE, and other competitive, academic and professional examinations.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own predominantly through notification of institutional Rules and Regulations through college website and prospectus.

# 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

To ensure that student assessment is continual and thorough, the college conducts regular class tests and Internal Assessments.

Formative Assessment is carried out by the evaluation of students through class tests, tutorial exercises, performance of the students in the class and students seminar etc.

Summative Assessment is carried out through:

- ❖ The Internal Assessments held at regular intervals every year for all students.
- ❖ The university examinations which are held annually in the UG Courses (1+1+1 Pattern) and semester wise (four semesters) in the PG courses.

On several occasions the heads of the departments encourage students to apply for review of answer scripts in support of the students' claim for higher grades. The students' past records in college examinations provide the heads of the departments with supportive data for such action. There have been instances when the observation of the departmental teachers has benefitted students.

# 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigour and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The institution ensures rigor and transparency in the internal assessment and weightages assigned for the overall development of students through a number of modalities which are as follows:

- ❖ The college strictly maintains transparency in the internal assessment of students.
- \* The internal examinations are characterised by strict invigilation mechanism.
- ❖ The scripts at UG and PG are evaluated in strict conformity with the norms and ideals of student assessment. The teachers adhere to the pattern of evaluation prescribed by the University.
- \* Record of marks of internal examinations and class tests are maintained by respective departments and by the examinations-office of the college.
- ❖ The departments also organize paper presentations, group discussions, debate, quiz in order to extract the best from each student.
- ❖ Students also participate in different intra, and inter-college co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Teachers usually judge intra-college competitions, which facilitates and encourages student-teacher bonds, as well as gives the

- teachers added information on the students' abilities, thus providing greater scope for a holistic assessment.
- ❖ Further, the Disciplinary Committee of the Teachers' Council keeps a strict vigil on the rigour and transparency in regard to the internal assessment of the students.

## 2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The graduate attributes of the college are specified in the stated goals and objectives of the college:

- To impart quality based higher education with an aim to acquire knowledge and develop critical thinking among the students. The questioning spirit and the urge to form original opinions are also at the top of the list of priorities.
- ❖ To develop responsible and sensitive youths on integration from diverse cultural, linguistic and religious groups who have social commitments and have an open, unbiased view of society.
- ❖ To create accountability within to ensure accountability to the society at large.

The college ensures the attainment of these by the students by the following ways:

- Providing a harmonious ambience within the institution where students can fulfill their potentialities.
- ❖ Making the students aware of the specific learning outcomes.
- **!** Ensuring the basics of discipline among the students.
- ❖ Organizing and promoting value based lectures and discussions to sensitize the young minds of the necessity for value based education.
- ❖ Emphasizing co-curricular and sports related activities to inculcate the importance of holistic view of education among the students.
- ❖ Encouraging the students to participate in extension activities like organizing blood-donation camps, adoption of villages, community service etc.

## 2.5.7. What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

In case of grievances regarding evaluation at the college level, following steps are followed:

- Answer scripts are shown to the students. The concerned teacher often explains to the students their weak points and ways for better performance.
- ❖ If not satisfied, the students may directly approach the Head of the Department with their grievance.

For redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation at the University level, following steps are followed:

- ❖ The students may apply for scrutiny or review of answer scripts, which is duly forwarded by the College authority.
- ❖ The university has provisions to show answer scripts under RTI. The college provides complete support to any individual student who wishes to assess the evaluation of one's scripts through this method.
- ❖ Students can also approach the Controller of Examinations or the Vice-Chancellor for intervention on their part, with regard to any anomalies. The institution supports the students 'cause in such cases.

### 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

## 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has clearly stated outcomes in all the academic and co-curricular activities carried out every year. One of the missions of the college has been the all-round development of its students and to make them responsible and ideal citizens. At the academic level, the students are trained to excel in their studies and perform well in the university examinations and our results bear testimony to the institution's efforts in this regard. The college also aspires to transform each student to a level where they would be able to relate to our core values and uphold the same and therefore would be able to contribute constructively to social transformation.

- ❖ At the beginning of a year different departments prepare their teaching plans and share it with the students.
- ❖ Each department has its own vision and mission, unique to the respective disciplines. This is explained to the learner at the time of induction.
- ❖ The results of internal assessments are considered with careful attention. Apart from that, class tests are conducted on occasional basis results of which are brought to notice of the departmental students to make them aware of their performance and preparedness.
- ❖ The Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the college organizes various programmes and interactive sessions with different companies/groups so that the students get chance to fulfil their definite learning outcomes in form of initiating their careers. Notices are circulated to the staff and students regarding the schedule of these sessions and campus interviews, if any.
- ❖ In addition to that some value based educational programmes, lectures and awareness campaigns on various social issues like child rights, thalassemia, kala-azar, rights of the differently-abled people, gender sensitization, anti-ragging human rights, evil of AIDS etc. are organized to inculcate moral values within minds of the students and to make them aware of the issues.


2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? This institution monitors the progress and performance of the students through the following mechanisms,

- ❖ Monitoring the performance of the students in the classroom interactions.
- ❖ Monitoring the performance of the students in the class tests/tutorial tests. In this regard, results of internal assessment are carefully monitored. After the declaration of university results, the same is displayed on the college notice board.
- ❖ Identifying the slow and advanced learners from the above mechanisms. Here, the teachers monitor the results of the students and tries to overcome any lacuna in the teaching-learning process in consultation with individual Departments.
- ❖ Feedback obtained in the Parents-teacher Meeting held annually in each department.

## 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The institution has devised teaching, learning and assessment strategies to accomplish the stated outcomes of the pedagogic process.

### **Teaching Strategies**

The teaching strategies followed in the college to realize the learning goals are to:

- Preparing teaching modules on specific topics included in the university syllabus and providing handouts to students.
- ❖ Preparing annual academic calendar in which the tentative examination schedule and the holiday list are mentioned.
- ❖ Employing creative teaching methodologies (especially ICT enabled) to impart knowledge, values and skills to attain the learning outcomes.

The following innovations are adopted by the institution for teaching and learning process:

- (1) <u>Use of participatory and innovative teaching-learning methodologies</u>:
- Preparing teaching modules on specific topics included in the university syllabus and providing handouts to students.
- Giving different types of written assignments such as MCQ, short answer type questions etc. as per the guidelines provided,
- Demonstration of experiments in the laboratories.

#### (2) <u>Use of Audio-Visual methods</u>:

- Using Microsoft PowerPoint to prepare study materials and to complement lectures in classrooms.
- Using teaching aids like OHP, LCD projector, maps, diagrams, charts etc. extensively.

Downloading and showing animations on selected topics.

### (3) Application of different educational software.

- Student friendly softwares like MS Office, C language related softwares, Minitab, R, GIS etc. are liberally employed.
- Reference materials are made available to students in the form of PDF, etc. on a regular basis.

### (4) <u>Catering to student specific teaching needs:</u>

- Individualized teaching modules are devised and remedial classes are taken to cater to the needs of weaker sections of Honours and General students in the concerned subjects.
- Study materials from reputed publishers like Sage, Routledge etc. are accessed, downloaded and distributed to students with the help of INFLIBNET NLIST.
   Study materials from different foreign universities are also distributed to the advanced learners.
- Student-centred teaching strategy is followed as far as possible.

### **Learning Strategies**

The learning strategies are given below,

- Ensuring continuous learning throughout the course period,
- Encouraging research oriented learning practices and a research culture for postgraduate students,
- Creating ambience for discussions and sharing as a strategy for engaged and involved learning,
- Learning process includes classroom transactions, self-study and library linkage,
- Encouraging field visits and other such academic engagements by which the students develop their knowledge, consciousness on conservation and nature and social orientation,
- Learning through assignments, seminars, project works and practical sessions, through which the students acquire and develop skill in collecting, processing and presenting relevant data, and also develop dexterity in communication, coordination, planning, management and academic writing.

### **Assessment Strategies**

- Continuous assessment gives clarity to the students on the areas to perform better and provides them with the opportunity to strategically integrate their efforts.
- Internal assessment, assignments, PowerPoint-presentation, surprise test, and university exams are the means of assessment strategies present in the college.

### **Institutional Structuring of Teaching, Learning and Assessment Strategies**

The teaching learning and assessment strategies of the institution are planned, structured and monitored at different levels. At the college level, this is ensured by the Officer-in-charge. The respective department and the academic sub-committee are involved in the planning, structuring and monitoring of the strategies. Academic sub-

committee meets on occasion to support the learning activities of the different departments.

## 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

- In the introductory classes of any course, teachers make the new students aware of the social and economic relevance of the course and how the study of the courses can be economically and socially significant. They also explain the job opportunities and scope of further studies and research work in the respective subject.
- The UGC Funded Entry-in-Services course offers guidance to the students for qualifying in different competitive examinations.
- The Career Counselling and Placement Cell takes initiatives to inform the students about different career opportunities and arranging for on-campus recruitments:

### 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze the student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- ❖ Each department maintains its data of the students' performance in college and university examinations. These data are analyzed and reviewed by the Academic Committee. If any matter requires general discussion, it is discussed in the Teachers' Council Meeting.
- ❖ In the departmental meetings, the performance of the students is discussed. Slow learners are identified and accordingly tutorial/remedial classes are arranged for them.

❖ The feedbacks from the Parent-teacher Mmetings of each department are also collected and analyzed for the same purpose.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes through the following ways:

- ❖ The departmental teachers constantly monitor the performance of the students.
- ❖ The Officer-in-charge and Academic Sub-committee of the college monitor the institutional learning outcomes.
- ❖ The Officer-in-charge of the college constantly interacts with the departmental heads as well as with individual teachers, to improve the quality of teaching process and increase the academic productivity. The Officer-in-charge also monitors the performance of individual teachers.
- ❖ The Academic Sub-committee makes suggestions to the departments regarding the effective way of teaching-learning. Assessment of formal and informal feedbacks from different stakeholders help the process of monitoring the teaching and learning system of the college.
- ❖ The Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the college and the departmental teachers give idea to the students about different openings of their subjects. Special attention is given to the PG students for preparations in NET/SET/GATE examination.
- ❖ The Career Counselling and Placement Cell also organizes various seminars, workshops and special lectures in this context.

# 2.6.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment outcomes as an indicator to evaluate student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

The institution and the faculty members assess the students on the basis of the internal examinations like internal assessment as prescribed by the university and other class tests/tutorial tests etc. After the evaluation of the answer scripts, the teachers show the evaluated answers scripts to the students pointing out the deficiencies of the answer. This helps the students to identify and consequently rectify their errors and achieve good performance in the university examination.

On the basis of the individual assessment of the students, the faculty members guide different students for different openings. Often advanced learners are groomed for advanced courses whereas slow learners are encouraged to elevate their academic level.

#### Recommendations:

❖ To encourage young faculty members to register themselves for pursuing Ph.D.

#### Impacts:

- ❖ A good number of Minor and Major research projects of UGC had been sanctioned during last 5 years.
- ❖ Most of the faculty members have completed or are registered for pursuing Ph.D.
- ❖ A respectable no of seminars and workshops had been organised by various departments with the collaboration of other institutions during last five years.

### 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

- Fund sanctioned without delay
- ❖ Major infrastructural facilities are provided (Lab, library, computer lab, internet etc.)
- ❖ There is a research lab in Chemistry dept.
- \* Researchers can pursue their research work beyond college hours and on holidays
- **Study** leave for research are available
- On duty leave for attending and presenting papers in seminars
- ❖ Institutional support is provided to enable implementation of research schemes in the following ways:
  - o Full autonomy is given to the Principal investigator for smooth conduct of the research project.
  - Funds sanctioned by the different agencies are released without delay as and when required by the researcher.
- ❖ The College provides major infrastructural facilities like library, laboratory, computer and internet facilities to pursue research activities. Central Instrument Facility containing sophisticated instruments are available (especially for Science departments) to researchers to carry out advanced investigations.
- ❖ Teachers in general are permitted to carry out their research work during summer and Puja vacations. Besides, one day per week is allotted for preparatory/research work. There is also a provision for Study Leave as per WBSR with prior approval from the Higher Education Department for completing research work. The teachers may also avail this facility under FDP scheme of UGC if required.
- ❖ Teachers who are pursuing M.Phil. / PhD and required to attend Course Work are provided with flexible working schedule. Duty Leaves are given to interested teachers who will present papers/participate in seminars and conferences.
- ❖ Laboratory facilities, equipments, Internet, LAN and other ICT enabled research support system, etc. are made available to researchers (details in Section 3.3).

❖ All research grants and expenditure are audited by qualified auditors of auditing firms. The final audit report and Utilisation Certificates are sent to the funding agencies in due time.

### 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The major steps taken to enhance the research environment and scientific disposition among students are:

- ❖ Increase in Seminars expose students to greater interactions beyond the syllabi and develop their research acumen.
- Special Lectures by eminent academicians and researchers are organised in order to instil research interests in students
- ❖ Dissertations with viva-voce are mandatory in PG programmes. This ensures that each student has an opportunity to demonstrate their individual research aptitudes.
- Seminar Library sessions allow students to access important books and be guided towards important journals/books by their teachers. PG students, in particular are encouraged to read recent research papers.
- ❖ Departmental seminars, student seminars, science based contests, exhibitions; training programmes are regular features of both UG and PG programmes.
- ❖ Access of online journals through INFLIBNET
- Several UG and PG Departments offer special modules on interdisciplinary courses.
- ❖ The undergraduate course of Geography, Anthropology and Bengali incorporate Field Work where the students have to submit a Field Report working as a Team. This inculcates research orientation and interest among the UG students. Some of the places visited by the students of these Departments are given below:

## 3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

As employees of Government of West Bengal, our teachers are not entitled to Sabbatical leave. However, they make optimal use of Summer and Puja vacations, Winter recess, holidays and preparatory days for pursuing their research.

## 3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The Department of Chemistry has tested the pH of water sample from different fisheries of Purba Medinipur and South 24 Parganas district which help fishermen to cultivate prawns which are extremely pH sensitive.

The Department of Chemistry has tested Haemoglobin levels of the girl students of the college and in consultation with medical practitioners advised the anaemic students to take IRON tablets.

The NSS team of the college organizes health awareness programme among the common people, Literacy Programme, Legal Aids to Women through visit to local community (Sukanta Colony, Gandhi Colony, Haldia)

Geography Department organized field study in Mahishadal block, Purba Medinipur District for health and sanitization awareness.

#### 3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

### 3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The Higher Education Department, Government Of West Bengal does not allocate any separate designated budget for research programme in the affiliated government colleges. However, many motivated faculty members of our college run research projects which are funded by different national or state agencies like UGC, DST, and CSIR etc. The college provides infrastructural and other facilities for the smooth run of these research projects. Apart from the funds from national agencies, a fraction of the Plan Expenditure of the State Govt. and Development Grant of UGC are utilized for purchasing sophisticated equipments which are used for research and development purpose in addition to the requirement of the curriculum. The teachers, who act as the Principal Investigators of these research programmes, use all these infrastructural facilities of the college which include library, instruments, laboratory, computer, internet etc. Detailed budgetary report is furnished in Criterion VI, Section 6.4.3 and 6.4.4.

## 3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The Institution is a Government College under the Higher Education Department, Govt. Of West Bengal and bound by the West Bengal Financial Rules. Under this circumstance there is no provision for providing seed money to the faculty members to carry out research programme.

## 3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

The institution is a government college and financially not autonomous, hence it is difficult to provide financial help to support research projects by students. However, the college provides all possible infrastructural support to the researchers which include library facilities, computer laboratories with internet connections, separate research laboratory space for conducting research projects. Post Graduate departments manage some amount of funds from miscellaneous source to carry out the dissertation/research works/project works which are included in their regular course curriculum.

## 3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The institution has a primary goal to develop an atmosphere of inter-disciplinary exchanges.

• The Post-Graduate Department of Chemistry invites different faculty members from the Physics Department to deliver lectures in specified areas.

Heads of different science departments and project leaders take responsibilities for optimal use of every instrument under them. Log books are maintained for proper use and maintenance of the instruments. Faculty members/students have to approach the head of the department to get access of an instrument belong to the corresponding department. Faculty members/research scholar from other institute also approaches to head of the department to get access UV-Vis spectrophotometer, fluorimeter, rotary evaporator etc.

The Institution has received many special grant or finances from beneficiary agencies like UGC, DST-FIST etc. for developing research facility. However the college do not receive any financial assistance from any industry. Details are given in section 6.4.4 and 6.4.3

#### 3.3 Research Facilities

### 3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The institute has separate research laboratories in Chemistry, Physics, Geography, Mathematics, and Statistics departments.

The Chemistry department has sophisticated instruments like UV-VIS spectrophotometer, Fluorimeter, Rotary Evaporator, Cold water circulator, UV Chember etc.

The Physics department has Planck's constant set up, Band Gap set up, Electromagnet, e/m set up by Thompson's method, Prism Setup, Cathode Ray Oscilloscope etc.

The Anthropology department has sophisticated instruments like Anthropometer, Sliding Calliper, Spreading Calliper, Pelvimeter, Cubic craniphore, Human Skeleton (5 in number), Human Skull (15 in number), Different type of rocks, Prehistoric stone tools, different type of cast material etc.

- ❖ The Geography department has Theodolite, Global Positioning system, Prismatic compass, Barometer, Soil testing kit, Clinometer etc.
- Separate Computer Room with Internet Facility in Chemistry, Geography, Physics, Mathematics, Statistics, Anthropology, Sociology, English, Bengali, Education.
- ❖ A separate General Library housing more than 40000 books and 32 journals.
- ❖ Access to research journals through INFLIBNET has been made available to teachers.
- ❖ Separate Seminar Libraries in all departments.

## 3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The institute has set up different academic and administrative sub-committees like

- ❖ "UGC", "Research Project Committee", "Seminar", "Library", and "Building Committee" work together to cater to the separate needs of the researchers.
- ❖ The sub-committees work individually and also cooperatively to chalk out plans for upgrading and creating new infrastructural facilities to meet the new and emerging areas of research.

- ❖ The UGC sub-committee monitors the funds sanctioned by UGC for the college, Minor and Major research projects.
- ❖ DST-FIST sub-committee monitors the funds sanctioned by DST-FIST.
- ❖ The "Building Committee" in consultation with PWD department, Govt. of West Bengal put proposal to State Govt. for construction and /or renovation of buildings and electrical fittings.
- ❖ The Research Project sub-committee encourages the Faculty members of various academic departments to undertake research projects.
- ❖ The "Library" sub-committee subscribes to new books, journals and e-journals keeping with the demands of the research scholars in both UG and PG departments.
- ❖ The scholars get access to e-journals through INFLIBNET.
- ❖ The remaining sub-committees provide additional support necessary to meet the needs of the researchers.
- ❖ The college ensures uninterrupted electric supply by setting up a special transformer and maintaining a generator.
- ❖ Expanding hostel and canteen facilities to help students to conduct research and project work at the PG level beyond normal hours.
- ❖ In addition, the college encourages the faculty to participate in Faculty Development programmes like Orientation Programme, Refresher Course, Seminar, Workshops, Symposium, Conference, etc. to stay up-to-date with the new and emerging areas of research.

## 3.3.3. Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments / facilities created during the last four years.

The college has received several special grants from UGC, DST-FIST, and State Government for developing research facilities. The major instruments and facilities created during last four years are given below.

#### 3.5 Consultancy

### 3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

Different departments of the College plan industry visits and educational tours from time to time. Such visits are very much in the curriculum of the Post Graduate Departments; additionally, some of the UG Departments have also conducted study tours so that the students get exposure to relevant industries or laboratories. A few examples are given below.

### 3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

All the faculty members of the institution are free to provide consultancy services on an honorary basis since they belong to the rank of Gazetted Officers (Group–A) in West Bengal Education and Senior Education Services (WBES, WBSES). No extra effort is made to advocate and publicize their expertise. However, their expertise being widely known through various sources like the college website, various organizations /institutes avail of their services frequently on honorary basis.

### 3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The IQAC and Research committees of the institution always encourage the faculties to extend consultancy service. They are provided with On-Duty Leave, if required, for offering their service. There is no scope for obtaining financial revenue for the institute as it is a full-fledged Government Institute under the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal. However, keeping the social commitment in mind, the institute always promotes different consultancy services by the teachers free of cost to different agencies when approached.

#### 3.6. Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

## 3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution- neighborhood- community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Haldia Government College organizes various programmes throughout the year to promote institution-neighbourhood-community network.

The NSS wing of the college started functioning in 2002 and has been an active body ever since. At present, the Institution has two strong NSS units: NSS Unit I and NSS Unit II coordinated by Mr. Bhuban Mohan Das and Dr. Tithi Bose respectively. The units are involved in various community works around the year for the betterment of the neighbourhood and the holistic development of the students. Student volunteers of NSS units are also involved in different community services contributing to good citizenship. In the session 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-2015 and 2015-16, the NSS organized the following events:

#### Details of NSS activity year wise

NSS Unit of Haldia Government College adopted a slum, Sukantanagar, about 1 km from the college premises in 2011. The activities in the session 2011-12 undertaken by the NSS Unit were:

- Community Health and hygiene awareness drive in collaboration with the doctors of Sub-Divisional Hospital, Haldia and Lions' Club, Durgachak.
- Creating pollution awareness amongst the slum dwellers.
- ❖ Promoting literacy campaigns with the help of the NSS volunteers.

Also, students have participated in the following events:

❖ Pre-Republic Day celebration zonal camp at Bhubaneswar which is a national level camp (2 boys and 1 girl).

- Pre-Republic Day celebration State level camp at Kolkata
- ❖ One girl has participated in a national level camp in Manali at Atal Behari Mountaineering Institute.

In session 2012-13 the NSS Units of Haldia Government College organized a Special Camp in the adopted slum areas on "General Health Awareness Creation". The following aspects were covered:

- 1. Thalassemia detection
- 2. Blood donation
- 3. HIV awareness
- 4. Legal awareness
- 5. Road safety awareness

Again in 2013-14, the NSS units organised a special camp in the adopted slum areas on "Legal Awareness Generation" which covered the following aspects:

- 1. Social audit
- 2. Para legal training

And also some activities related to health has been organised

- 1. Thalassemia detection camp
- 2. Blood donation camp
- 3. HIV awareness camp

In 2014-15, the NSS units of the college organized a special camp in the adopted slum areas on "Life style Management Awareness" which covered the following aspects:

- 1. Social audit
- 2. Para legal training
- 3. Thalassemia detection camp
- 4. Blood donation camp

In 2015-16, the NSS units of the college could not organise any special camp year, however the NSS has organised the following extension activities:

- 1. World AIDS day rally and awareness generation initiatives at nearby slum areas.
- 2. Anti-Drug (Substance abuse) rally in collaboration with Haldia Police Station.
- 3. Thalassemia detection camp (two in number) in collaboration with Thalassemia Society of Midnapur district.
- 4. Investment awareness generation programme in collaboration with Securities and Exchange Board of India.
- 5. Seminar on "International mother language day: History, tradition and legacy" organized by NSS along with cultural programmes by the students to celebrate International Mother Tongue Day.
- 6. Seminar on "Violences: Everydayness and Extraordinary" in an attempt to foster notions of gender equality.

7. The NSS units have started a blog to disseminate information related to NSS activities of the college (url: http://nsshgc.blogspot.in/).

### 3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The college has several bodies like NSS unit-I and unit-II, Sports Committee, Cultural Committee constituted with different departmental faculty members to supervise the students' activities inside and outside the campus. The teachers always guide and accompany the students in their involvement of various social movements and activities for promoting citizenship role.

During electoral roll preparation, the college administration and District Administration jointly organize dedicated camps for college students to enrol new voters.

College NSS units (I and II) are guided by two college teachers who are wholeheartedly involved with the students in different social activities.

various committees like Cultural Sub-committee, Seminar Sub-committee work together and exchange ideas with students to work out fruitful method of promoting Institution-neighbourhood-community network.

### 3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The institution gives immense importance to the stakeholders' perceptions on the performance and quality of the institution.

As part of the Internal Quality Assessment, the final year UG and PG students are asked to fill feedback questionnaires on teaching-learning process and infrastructural support of the college. This feedback is considered and evaluated by the respective departments in order to enhance the teaching-learning process and incorporate the valid suggestions of the students.

Feedbacks and valuable suggestions from the parents are taken through "Parent-Teachers' Meet" at regular intervals in each department. This process is very helpful to understanding the parents' views on the performance of the institute.

Our institution has an Alumni association and the institute takes feedback from alumni members through meeting with alumni association to upgrade the teaching-learning process.

Our college runs Remedial classes after the scheduled classes to help the weaker section of the students.

Teachers' Council Meetings are held regularly to take important academic decision and to resolve different academic issues for smooth running of the college.

Teachers are also motivated by the Principal to join the NSS camp and make the extension activities meaningful.

In spite of its manifold academic commitments, Haldia Govt. College also takes into consideration the problems and necessities of the differently abled students of this college. According to the norms and guidelines of UGC, the college has constituted the 'Equal Opportunity Cell' for providing and monitoring the necessary support system to the students with special needs. The college also ensures barrier-free environment for students with special learning needs and assures them equal opportunities and full participation in regular teaching-learning process and similar co-curricular activities in the college premises. The above mentioned committee arranged several awareness programmes, seminar and discussions on inclusive-education.

1. Special lecture and discussion session with District Judge on "Awareness programme on Legal Aids for Women".

This type of awareness programme helps the women in understanding the laws available to protect them in different adverse condition of society.

2. Workshop on "Gender Sensitivity and Sexual Harassment".

This type of workshop helps to understand the types of sexual harassment occurs to both male and females.

3. UGC sponsored Two Days Workshop titled "Including the excluded: Initiatives towards a more just society". This workshop discusses the problems faced by people with disabilities (both physical and intellectual) and the initiatives to include them in mainstream society.

On the whole, the college makes sincere endeavour to look after the facilities of the students with special needs by arranging for wheel-chair, building ramps etc. These efforts do not only reassure the differently-abled students but also reflect the sensitized atmosphere of the institution.

The students of this college are involved in NSS and NCC activities.

Different outreach programmes, extension activities, social survey activities etc. enable them in communicating with different levels in society, which will help them to grow leadership quality, maintaining discipline in every aspect of life, make them sensitive towards social responsibilities, help them to grow the spirit of social service.

These programmes will contribute to the process of nation building.

# 3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participating in its activities?

The Institution is an exemplary centre of excellence in the region which imparts along with academic instructions to its students, the fundamental values of life.

The NSS units of the college organize special camps in nearby villages. Popular lectures in local languages and health camps attract local people to the camp where students and teachers interact with them.

Students are encouraged to clean the college and the surrounding area. They also organize "Plastic free" drive campaigns not only within the college campus but also in the neighbouring locality. During this campaign they collect and get rid of all plastic materials which are less than 40 microns thick. The students also try to convey to the local people the harmful effects of reusing thin plastic sheets and bottles.

#### 3.7 Collaboration

#### i. Classrooms

:There are 44 class rooms including smart class rooms and virtual class room in this College. The department wise break up is given in above table.

- **ii. Technology Enabled Learning Spaces**: Two smart class rooms at postgraduate departments, one virtual class room and all departments have computers with internet facility which is used as technology enabled learning space.
- **iii. Seminar Halls, Tutorial Spaces**: There is one seminar hall on the first floor of the college where seminars, conferences, workshops, meetings and other cultural programmes are held.
- iv. Laboratories conduct
- : All science departments have well equipped laboratories to

practical classes and university examinations. The department of Chemistry has one dedicated research laboratory for major and minor research programmes. The postgraduate students carry out their research projects in this laboratory.

- v. Botanical Garden: The College does not have any specified botanical garden.
- vi. Animal House: The College does not have Zoology or Physiology department and hence the College does not have animal house.
- vii. Specialized Facilities and Equipment For Teaching: Two postgraduate departments have smart class rooms with LCD projectors and other departments also have separately LCD projectors for power point based teaching and learning. Recently the college established virtual class rooms with audio-visual recording facility. Apart from these, the whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled to access internet.
- viii. Learning And Research etc.: Library Books & journals Ca. 50,000; INFLIBNET, Free Wi-Fi

- b. Extra-curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.
  - i. Sports: Although the College does not have any specified playground, a free space in between two hostels is used for sports. Students play football, volleyball, cricket etc in this ground regularly and interdepartmental competition is organized during annual sports.
  - **ii. Outdoor and Indoor games**: The Students' Union organizes different outdoor games (football, volleyball, cricket, kho-kho, badminton, running, jumping, throwing,) and indoor games (tennis, carom, chess etc.) during annual sports in the college campus.
- **iii. Gymnasium** : The college has a gymnasium located in the Physical Education department.
- iv. Auditorium: The college does not have any auditorium. However the college has a conference room with a seating capacity of 120 persons where all types of seminar, conferences, workshops and other cultural activities are being organized. A mini conference room is located

on the ground floor for different activities.

- v. NSS: The college has two active NSS units (Unit-I and Unit-II). The NSS units organize different outreach programmes like community development, health camp, campus cleaning, and awareness programmes through seminars/workshops/special lectures.
- vi. NCC: The College has a NCC wing and a designated Nodal officer. The NCC wing organizes different activities like Republic Day celebration, Independence Day celebration. Recently the 55 Bengal Battalion organized a 10 days camp at the college campus.
- vii. Cultural Activities : The Students' Union of the College organizes annual cultural programmes. In addition to these, all academic departments organize Freshers' welcome and Teachers day celebration.
- viii. Public Speaking: The students take part in quiz competitions, debates extempore speech competitions etc. as part of the College annual cultural competition. Apart from this, students of different academic departments take part in 'mock parliament' organized by District and State level Youth Parliament department. This type of participation certainly helps the students to develop public speaking skills.

- **ix. Communication Skills Development:** The English department of the College does not have any specified language lab. A proposal has been sent to the government, for setting up this facility.
- **x. Yoga**: Though there is no separate yoga training programme centre in this college, the Physical Education Department conducts regular classes on yoga.
- xi. Health and Hygiene etc.: The Anthropology department and Physical
  Education department have some basic facility for primary health
  check-up. Laboratory based departments have First-Aid box
  facility. NSS units organize different health check-up plan like
  Thalassemia check up camp among the students of the College,
  Anti-AIDS campaign in local community etc. All teaching and
  non-teaching staff members are covered under cashless West
  Bengal Health Scheme.
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The college authorities always emphasize upon the best and optimum use of its available infrastructure. The following are some of the major points through which these are ensured:

- ❖ Master routine is prepared according to availability of class rooms.
- Distance education classes and classes for Netaji Subhas Open University are held on Sundays and Saturdays (after regular college hours).
- ❖ Vidyasagar University examinations are held in college class rooms from the second week of March to August. Most of the examinations are conducted without affecting normal class routines.
- ❖ Vidyasagar University practical examinations are also held in departmental laboratories without affecting normal schedule of the college students.
- Teachers utilize their vacation periods in project works.
- Since the infrastructure of the college is the property of the State Government, sometimes various public examinations like WBJEE, PSC, SSC, etc. are held in available college class rooms.

The college is conscious and concerned about the basic needs of the students with physical disabilities.

- There is a ramp in the main entrance in the college building. The college provides wheel-chair for physically disabled students.
- During preparation of academic class routine, best efforts are given to arrange classes for physically disabled students on the ground floor.
- Utmost care is always taken to resolve the matters of those students with top priority so that they need not pass through queues, agony, or waste time.

- ❖ Facilities for medical emergencies: No dedicated medical officer is available in the hostel campus but in case of emergency, contact numbers of ambulance and other car providers are available. The nearest government hospital is just 10 min away by car.
- **★ Library facility in the hostels:** Boys hostel have a specific library where students can issue books by maintaining a register.
- **❖ Internet and Wi-Fi facility:** Internet facility through free Wi-Fi is available in both hostels.

- Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipment: There is a colour TV in the Boys' Hostel for availing educational programmes.
- **Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy:** There is a separate teachers' hostel inside the campus.
- **Constant supply of safe drinking water:** The college has installed water purifying systems at both hostels. There is constant supply of water at students and teachers hostels.
- Security: None of the hostels has any government sanctioned post of superintendent and night guards. However, the college has recruited separate night guards on contractual basis from its own fund.

- ❖ Being a government college, the staff members including teaching faculty members get cashless Health Care Facility covered by **West Bengal Health Scheme**.

The college gives extensive emphasis on ICT enabled teaching and learning for the students and other stakeholders.

- ❖ The postgraduate departments have smart classrooms with LCD projectors. Special classes, project reviews, model based teaching etc. is being executed in these smart class rooms.
- Various other academic departments also have LCD projectors that they use for teaching learning purpose.
- Three virtual classrooms have been established in the College for online classes through internet with audio visual recording.
- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.
  - The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled and hence the college emphasizes on internet based teaching learning among the students and teachers.
  - PowerPoint based teaching in smart class helps the students in understanding real model based subjects especially the structure of macromolecules like proteins, DNA, nanoparticles etc.
  - In virtual class room, recording facility is available where students can take soft copy of the class lecture and may revisit it as and when required. The same facility may be used for online classes through high speed internet connection.
  - Faculty members can access various e-journals through INFLIBNET. This facility can be availed off-campus also. This provides a number of research articles, study materials which helps them to teach students in more interactive way and makes them abreast with front-level status of the relevant subjects.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the College?

- Campus cleaning programme is initiated by NSS unit of the College. NSS student volunteer and faculty members involved in this holy programme wholeheartedly to clean the campus occasionally.
- Pest Control is done at regular intervals in all departments and office area to protect infrastructures and resources from termites and other insects.
- **\*** Keeping regular contact with PWD for building maintenance, electrical maintenance etc.
- AMC is signed with some vendors to keep functioning several facilities like drinking water purifying systems, computers etc.

Anti-virus software is installed in important computers to protect them from viruses.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

- Trained persons from the specific vendors visit the departments annually for calibration of high end instruments.
- Regular laboratory instruments are calibrated by departmental teachers during the examinations and during the practical session.
- Sometimes students are also engaged in this job during practical practice classes.

- The College has a 50 KV KOHLER power backup generator to ensure constant power supply during important college activities like seminar, conference, examinations etc.
- Apart from that science departments have their own UPS system for smooth functioning of their high end instruments against voltage fluctuation, power cuts etc.
- ❖ Haldia Municipality and Haldia Development Authority provides water supply to college in regular basis. Apart from that college has its own submersible pumps and designated pump house to fill water in storage tank.
- Non-teaching staff members of the college ensure continuous supply of water to laboratories and lavatories and to other parts of the college.
- Electrical maintenance and new electrical work falls under purview of Public Works Department, Government of West Bengal.

#### **Tuition fee-waiver scheme:**


Tuition fee-waiver scheme or free studentship is the primary form of scholarship provided at the institutional level. The Departmental teachers interact closely with their students and

### 5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections?

- ❖ The Institution follows the extant reservation policies of the Government to earmark seats for SC, ST and OBC students.
- ❖ SC/ ST Complaint Cell.
- ❖ The Institution informs in due time the SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker students about various facilities to be provided to them by the Government and other educational institutions and motivates them to avail all those facilities.
- ❖ The Institution effectively handles the whole process of collection and allocation of fund regarding grants, scholarships, free studentships etc.

❖ The Students' Aid Fund is also extended to the economically weaker section of the students in the form of reducing examination fees, tuition fees and excursion grants etc.

#### Students with physical disabilities

- ❖ As per Govt. norms, the Institution follows the extant reservation policy (3% seats) for the physically disabled students in each discipline during admission procedure.
- ❖ Visually challenged students have a provision for availing assistance of scribes during Unit Tests and University Examinations.

#### **Overseas students**

As no overseas student has been admitted to this college in the recent past, a specialized support system meant for them has not been contemplated. However, they are entitled to avail all the facilities enjoyed by other students.

#### Students to participate in various competitions/National and International:

- ❖ The Institution provides necessary financial and logistical support for students participating in district/state/national/international level competitions. In this respect, it should be stated that in different years NSS volunteers of the institution have represented our college at national and international camps
- ❖ The Institution informs, motivates and guides students to participate in cocurricular events like sports, dance, drama, debate along with different academic events including paper/poster presentations at workshops/seminars organized by various institutions. Different relevant committees of the Teachers' Council and the Students' Union ensure student participation in various programmes throughout the year.

#### Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance, etc.

- Govt. hospitals as well as a number of private hospitals / nursing homes are in the close vicinity. The students are to their medical treatment through Students' Health Home and, accordingly, each student is charged a nominal fee at the time of admission.
- The Institution has its own arrangement for providing First Aid facility. In case of emergency, the institution opts for other medical facilities provided by the nearby medical centers.
- ❖ Awareness programmes such as rallies and seminars are organized by the institution to generate awareness among the students and teachers about fatal diseases like AIDS, Thalasemia, Dengue etc. on a regular basis.

#### Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- ❖ Entry-in-Services programme", under UGC XIIth Plan for SC/ST/OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) and Minority candidates who have completed Bachelor's Degree/H.S or Madhyamik, is one endeavor which has run successfully in this College.
- ❖ The Institution provides updated information about various job opportunities through its Career Counseling Cell.
- ❖ Departmental teachers of Science disciplines also groom their students for competitive examinations like JAM, ISI etc.

#### Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

A good number of the college students, at their entry level are already proficient in basic computer skills, due to incorporation of computer literacy into the school level curriculum. Various softwares such as GIS Open Source, Minitab, R, Spectramanager, FelixGX are used by various academic departments (both teachers and students) for the analysis of data.

#### Support for "slow learners".

Remedial classes and tutorials are organized by the concerned departments for such slow learners.

- ❖ Bilingual (Bengali & English) explanation and discussions are undertaken by teachers inside the classroom.
- ❖ They are asked to submit the assignment of the topics.

### Exposure of students to their institution of higher learning/ corporate/ business house, etc.

Trips to research laboratories and academic institutions of repute enable the students to make informed choices regarding their career and higher studies. The PG Departments recommend their M.Sc. Students for project work at various research Institutes for exposure of the students towards research.

#### **Publication of student magazines**

Different departments publish Wall Magazines annually at different points of time throughout the year.

The Career Counseling Cell provides necessary information and prospects of entrepreneurship in various fields to the students.

Different companies like TCS, Wipro, LNT, and PWC visited college for direct campus recruitment in recent years. The Axis Bank (Haldia Branch) also visited our college for direct recruitment of the college students. The college in collaboration with George Telegraph organized a one day career counseling workshop in 2016. The Career Counseling Cell of the college is also planning for career counseling workshops to motivate students towards civil service and social service.

- ❖ Academic and personal counseling of the students are undertaken by the departmental teachers themselves. Remedial and tutorial classes are taken to support the slow learners, while the advanced learners are groomed for their career progression.
- ❖ Career Counseling Cell of the College undertakes counseling services to enable the students imbibe soft skills. GSCASH maintains a proactive environment for gender sensitization among all the stakeholders.
- ❖ A Student Counseling Cell is in place to address psychological and other problems of the students. Expert counselors offer their services.

# 5.1.9. Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'ýes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

- ❖ Yes, the College has a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement assistance for its students. The Career Counseling Cell of the College organizes industry interactions involving various reputed agencies whereby the students can identify the knowledge gap and the means to bridge the same. Job opportunities are also discussed in such sessions.
- ❖ UGC Entry-in-services programme is running successfully in this College. Teachers have been imparting professional and life-skills to many aspirants from disadvantaged sections of the society.
- ❖ About direct placement of students through campus interview, it is indeed uncommon to see instances where companies have recruited fresh graduates-to-be from general degree colleges on the basis of their qualification only. As the market determined model of economy reserves mainly the non-technical jobs and back-office jobs for students from non-science disciplines of general degree

- colleges, the placement related functions are getting more and more specialized in nature.
- ❖ People deeply associated with the contours of the industry will perhaps be able to shed more light on the nuances and inner dynamics of placement. So the Career and Counselling Cell of the College proposes to partner with the HR wings of major industry heavyweights and rope in their expertise to enrich the employability possibilities of our students.

### 5.1.10. Does the institution have a Student Grievance Redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

- ❖ The College has an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC), formed as per the Vishakha guidelines. It also has a Grievance Redressal Cell where students can record their grievances.
- ❖ Complaint boxes have been placed in multiple strategic locations of the College. There is provision for Complaint-Box also to maintain the anonymity of complainants of harassments.
- ❖ Students are always encouraged to express their complaints and requirements freely. But no formal grievance/complaint has been reported in the recent past. The reason may be that the students have free access to the Officer-in-Charge and departmental Heads and are more comfortable to talk with the concerned administrative heads. The Officer-in-Charge always extends patient hearing student's complaints and immediately tries to resolve their problems. Departmental heads also try their best to sort out the problems with the help of the available infrastructure. For instance, students of a few departments expressed their displeasure about the non-availability of their preferred books. The issue has been handled effectively, while giving priority to their demand.

### 5.1.11. What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

- ❖ An Internal Complaints Committee (ICC), formed as per the Vishakha guidelines, looks after the issues related to sexual harassment. Complaint boxes have been placed in multiple strategic locations of the College, while focusing on keeping the anonymity of complainants of sexual harassments intact.
- ❖ The ICC often takes drives for gender sensitization among all the stakeholders of the institution.
- ❖ The institution feels a legitimate pride to proclaim that, not a single case had been reported to the committee in the last five years due to strict vigilance exercised by the authority on the college campus.

- ❖ Yes, there is an Anti-Ragging Committee in the College, comprising of senior teachers. "UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009" is prominently displayed in the College website. Students are also made aware of the National Anti-Ragging Help Line (UGC Crisis Hotline) having the 24x7 Toll Free Number 1800-180-5522 and the email helpline@antiragging.in. The information packs from the anti-ragging portals are displayed in the College website in both English and the vernacular.
- ❖ It should be mentioned here that no formal complaints related to ragging within the campus has been reported to the College Authority during the last four years or the recent past before. However, the college authority is not complacent on this front. Strict vigil is maintained to prevent and/or punish any untoward incidents.

By various students welfare schemes, the college tries to provide a healthy environment for students. The schemes are:

- ❖ All the students of our college are member of "Students" Health Home". They are entitled to get free medical checkups, treatment and hospitalization (if necessary). The College also has made provision for first aid facility within the campus, to take care of minor healthcare issues on the campus.
- ❖ Book bank has been constituted to cater to the needs of the poor but meritorious students.
- Students' aid fund or the Poor-Fund, is utilized for various requirements of individual students such as examination fees, educational tour expenses etc. The Officer-in-Charge of the college also uses his discretionary powers to waive the admission fees of needy students.

Suggestions for improvement in sports facilities were provided by them.

Formal and informal feedbacks are collected from graduate students, teaching and non-teaching staff, parents and recognized alumni to improve the performance of the institution in different academic aspects. Collected feedbacks are implemented, on the recommendation of IQAC, in different fields like question design, class digitalization and infrastructural facilities available at the College, class performance of teachers etc.

Students of various Departments of the College publish their Wall Magazines periodically. These are displayed properly for nurturing the culture of extra-curricular activities.

Election process is generally conducted through the months of January of each year as per University schedule. The election schedule is prepared in consultation with the district administration. An Election Committee comprising the faculty members is constituted to oversee the election process. The Principal/Officer-in-Charge of the College is also the ex-officio President of the Students' Union.

The Students' Union is a highly active body looking after the welfare of the general students. The members of the Union always cooperate with the college authority to maintain the healthy academic atmosphere of the college. The members also extend their full cooperation during the process of admission, different games and sports events, Annual Sports and Athletic Meet, blood donation camp and other extracurricular activities. The union organizes various cultural programmes like Fresher's Welcome, Teachers' day celebration, Annual social function, Saraswati Puja etc.

A part of the fees collected from the students at the time of their admission, earmarked as Union Fees, is utilized by the Students' Union in running their various activities during their tenure.

### 5.3.6. Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

Several academic and administrative bodies of the College have student representative to facilitate smooth running of policy and its implementation. These are as follows:

#### **Governing Body:**

Governing Body is the highest administrative body of the college. The GB takes decisions in connection with various developmental proposal of the college as a whole. The president of the Governing Body is the District Magistrate of Purba Medinipur. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is a member.

**IQAC:** This is an important body of the college entrusted with the responsibility of quality control and development planning. IQAC includes two students of Postgraduate departments.

**Cultural Committee:** The Cultural Committee keeps in contact with the Cultural Secretary, Students' Union to mobilize the students in conducting the cultural programmes.

College games and sports Committee: This committee also maintains steady connection with the Students' Union to mobilize the students in conducting various games and sports activities.

The College Development Committee: This is a General Committee outside the purview of the Teachers' Council, and has representation from all the direct stakeholders of the College. Along with teachers and non-teaching staff, the students also are an active part of this committee entrusted to look after the overall development of the College.

**Equal Opportunity cell:** The Cell emphasizes on creating a condition of equal access in the midst of diversity. As a measure of promoting inclusion and diversity at the institutional level a number of affirmative action programmes are undertaken by this College. The students' union has a role to play here in assisting to identify the broad thrust areas.

**NSS Committee:** The student members, who are also NSS Volunteers, play active part and motivate others in the different activities of the NSS Unit of Haldia Govt. College.

### 5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

The Officer-in-Charge is the chief patron of the Alumni Association. Meetings are held in the college and students and staff of the college collaborate with the Alumni Association in organizing outreach programmes. ### CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

#### 6.1.1 Vision, Mission and Objectives of the Institution

- ❖ As one of the two government-owned general degree colleges meant for the dissemination of higher education in the district of Purba Medinipur, this college has as its primary objective the strict observance of quality and standard relating to the study of different subjects.
- ❖ As an institute of higher education the college aims primarily at achieving the supreme goals of higher education and not just at developing an examination oriented competitive mindset among the students. The principles of character-building and inculcation of higher values in young receptive minds are the priority of our teaching-learning process.
- ❖ The Government's commitment to provide equal opportunities for all prospective students across social divisions of class, gender and income is fulfilled daily through the running of this college. Specially, the scope of pursuing quality higher education in exchange of comparatively lower tuition fees is one of the chief hallmarks of this college. Affirmative action in the form of special attention to the needs of weaker sections of the students is in place.

### 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The top management Governing Body (GB), Principal and faculty act in perfect harmony to ensure a smooth functioning of the college administration and the essence of democracy is strongly reflected in the entire mechanism of policy formulation and implementation.

- ❖ The Governing Body President is an external member from Haldia Development Authority (HDA) and the Secretary is the Officer-in-charge of this college. Apart from that, Government representatives, V.C.'s nominee, Executive engineer and representatives of various stakeholders like teachers, non-teaching staff and students form the rest of the GB.
- ❖ Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was established in 2013, which plans and implements infrastructural and academic upgradations. It comprises of the Officer-in-Charge (Chairperson), the Teacher's Council Secretary, several faculty members, student representatives, administrative/technical staff, nominee from the alumni association and external members in the form of representatives from the Government, University and Haldia Development Authority. The members of IQAC

- hold meetings with various stakeholders regularly, frame AQAR annually and have thus been able to contribute significantly as an advisory body as well as a vigilant monitoring unit of the college.
- ❖ In various Teachers' Council meetings held on a regular basis throughout the year, different committees comprising of the faculties are formed to handle different facets of academic and administrative responsibilities. Based on the various recommendations by the GB and the IQAC, quality policies and plans are formulated and implemented by the committees of the Teachers' Council in an efficient manner.

#### 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

#### a) The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

The Principal, the IQAC and the GB of the college work together to ensure that the proper policy statements are timely followed up and the directives of UGC and the Higher Education Department of Government of West Bengal are sincerely implemented through adequate action plans. The Teachers' Council meetings are arranged on a regular basis to discuss the effectiveness of the action plans for fulfillment of the institutional mission. The IQAC arranges couple of meetings every year with faculty members, students, non-teaching staff, alumni and others for this purpose.

### b) Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

The Teachers' Council forms various committees to formulate proper action plans for all operations. The Heads of the Departments are entitled to frame departmental action plans, keeping in mind the mission and vision of the institute. The plans and strategies of various segments are finally brought together in the Teachers' Council meetings and GB meetings, which assess and approve the plans and incorporate it into the institutional strategies.

#### c) Interaction with stakeholders:

Our institution believes in the "Team Work" which plays the key role for steady progress and prosperity of the college. All the stakeholders of our college consisting of the people who benefit and contribute towards our institution and the people who are connected to our college in any way (directly or indirectly), are integral parts of our college. The more we work as a team, the better we move forward towards our mission. Therefore, our institution takes the matter of interaction with the stakeholders very seriously. The stakeholders, in our case, are administration, teachers, students, non-teaching staff, parents, and local community associated with the college. The interactive sessions go as follows:

- The Principal meets the HODs at the beginning of every session to discuss about admission policy and criteria and specific requirements of the respective departments to conduct the classes properly.
- ❖ The Principal, the members of the IQAC and the GB keep interactions with the teachers, students, and other stakeholders in every possible ways formally or informally.
- ❖ The Principal and the IQAC meet with the students' representatives and non-teaching staff members regularly and their concerns are addressed.
- ❖ Parent-Teacher meetings are arranged by the respective departments to update the parents about the strength and weakness of their wards.
- ❖ The college nurtures an amicable atmosphere so that anybody may feel free to approach the administration and to express himself/herself.

### d) Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs, and consultation with the stakeholders:

Need based analysis: The leadership is involved in ensuring proper support for the policies undertaken. An effective feedback system and feedback analysis helps the administration to understand the necessities of stakeholders properly and to take adequate measures, which will support the action plans meant for the advancement of the institution. The IQAC collects feedbacks from the students about teachers' evaluation, library and laboratory facilities, internet facilities, and other infrastructural issues at the end of every session. Students' attendance and results of internal assessment are analyzed at the departmental level to ascertain student needs and action plan modifications. Similarly, in Teachers' Council meetings, necessities of faculty members are discussed and addressed.

**Research inputs:** The college encourages research activities and provides supports for policy and planning of every kind that is required. Research Committee is set up in order to look after the issues related to research inputs. The faculties are encouraged for major and minor research projects.

Consultation with the stakeholders: The top management consults with various stakeholders to ensure proper support for policy implementation. The student feedback system, Teachers' Council meetings, parent teacher meetings, IQAC interactions with faculty members, students' representatives, non-teaching staff, alumni and local administration, various committees such as Purchase Committee, Research Committee, Library Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, GSCASH, Sports Committee, Women's Cell, Teachers' Council support effective execution of the action plans.

#### e) Reinforcing the culture of excellence and Champion organizational change:

The college always stands sentinel over our long-standing culture of excellence and is dedicated to maintain and uplift its standard by worthwhile organizational reforms. The relevant measures include:

- ❖ Constant attention is directed towards effective upgradation of knowledge base of all teaching staff by ascertaining participation in Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Research, Seminars and Workshops etc.
- ❖ Individual Departments are persuaded to organize seminars, workshops to upgrade the knowledge base of the students also.
- ❖ A student-friendly online admission interface has been introduced and used for last few years.
- ❖ Smart classrooms and departmental libraries have been constructed.
- ❖ As advised by the IQAC, the NSS units have become highly active and arrange seminars and rallies on burning social issues like gender violence, thalassemia awareness, drug addiction, the history and legacy of language.
- ❖ Initiatives taken to open post-graduate courses in the Chemistry and Geography department.

## 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution adopts certain procedures to monitor and evaluate policies and plans, and keeps a regular check on their effectiveness and worthwhile improvisations. ### 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management.

The top management empowers the faculty members by providing strong academic leadership as follows:

- ❖ Faculty members organize seminars funded by UGC or state government in the respective departments.
- ❖ They are encouraged to take up research projects funded by UGC, DST and other funding agencies.

- ❖ They are encouraged and supported in making use of the latest technologies as unconventional modes of classroom teaching. Computer and internet facilities, projectors, smart classrooms are provided to the faculties based on need analysis.
- ❖ The Heads of the departments have the freedom to formulate and execute specific plans for the progress of the respective departments.
- ❖ Encourage participation of faculty members to participate in national, international, regional, topical conferences, seminars etc. and to present papers there.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college grooms leadership at various levels to ensure functional decentralized administrative machinery. At the student level, there is Students Union that takes care of needs and grievances of the students' community and communicates the same to the top management. There are student representatives in the IQAC to express the view of the students' segment. In the Boys' and Girls' hostel, there are hostel committees consisting of hostel boarders, which deals with the issues related to the hostel infrastructure including food quality, building maintenance. At the departmental level, faculty members are assigned various academic and administrative responsibilities relevant to the smooth functioning of the college as a whole. They are encouraged to take up research initiatives also. The faculty members organize national seminars and workshops funded by UGC or state government, where students act as volunteers. The NSS units and Women's cell are active in arranging awareness programs on various social issues like gender violence, drug addiction, thalassemia camp etc. The Principal invites suggestions from the faculty members, non-teaching staff and students' union on crucial matters related to the institute. In this way, our institute strives to ignite the spirit of leadership at every level by creating an environment of active participation and freedom of decision-making.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Under the able leadership of the top management and pioneering guidance of the principal, the departments/units enjoy operational autonomy in academic matters. The departments take decision on the class routine, syllabus distribution among faculties, internal examinations, upgradation of classroom and laboratory infrastructure and instruments or consumables to be purchased (within budget limit approved by the purchase committee). Also from contingency fund, departments can purchase several items additionally required for teaching and other academic affairs. For departmental library, departments can purchase books of their choice within the approved budget. Furthermore, decentralization is ensured by formation of committees comprising of senior experienced faculty members, which oversee administrative matters as follows:

The Teachers' Council meetings, IQAC meetings and Governing Body meetings ensure proper deployment of the stated quality policy.
- viii) Different committees composed of faculty members (Art. 6.1.4) ensure that academics, finance, purchase, admission Teachers' Council procedures are carried out according to the stated quality policy. These committees are also vigilant about providing equal opportunity to the stakeholders of all socioeconomic strata, prevention of sexual harassment, proper redressal of students' grievances and ragging complaints, ensuring adequate library facilities, development of athletic skills and many such other aspects of the institution. - xi) Introduction of more and more post-graduate programmes.



# 6.2.5 How does the head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts Teachers' Council) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The principal of the institution ascribes the responsibility of collecting feedback in the form of the questionnaire to the IQAC. Apart from that, there is a complaint box at the entrance of the college (adjacent to the college office). Separate committees (like sexual harassment cell, women's cell, anti-ragging committee and equal opportunity cell etc.) have been formed to provide a platform to the students to express their views, opinions, and grievances. The IQAC meets representatives from all segments of the stakeholders to directly be in touch with them and collect information about the real situation. The principal invites suggestions and seeks feedback on various issues ranging from academic to socio-economic from the non-teaching staff, students union representatives and teachers council by meeting them directly. Above all, there is an amicable ambience pervading the college which allows all the stakeholders to interact with each other freely and there is free exchange of information about the status of different activities in the college. All such information are available with the principal and eventually with the top management. This enables a systematic and disciplined approach towards full-fledged implementation of the desired policy and planning.

### 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and the efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management encourages and supports the active participation of both teaching and non-teaching staff in the governance mechanism to ensure efficiency and fluidity of the institutional management processes. There are different layers of participatory management whereby the staff can be involved in the institutional processes:

- i) **Governing Body**: The highest policy making body of the college has representatives from the staff. This body is responsible for the policy formulation and chalking out the guideline for their proper implementation. All the recommendations from various bodies are implemented following the final approval of this Governing Body.
- ii) **Teachers' Council**: The Teachers' Council forms different committees (Art. 6.1.4) to take care of different aspects of academics, infrastructure and administration.
- iii) **IQAC**: The IQAC has representatives from teachers as well as administrative/technical staff. This cell strives to maintain the standard of the institution by sincerely monitoring the institutional processes and giving worthwhile suggestions.
- iv) **Departmental autonomy**: The head of the departments discuss with the faculty members and take decisions about the class routine, teaching load distribution, internal assessment calendar, recommendations for library books and other office items to be purchased, lab equipment and consumables to be purchased, field work or lab visits and the necessary upgradation of physical infrastructure of classrooms and laboratories. These decisions are communicated to the Principal and they are supported after proper consideration.
- v) **Feedback system**: The opinions and suggestions of the teaching faculties and non-teaching staffs are always invited and heeded to in various meetings between the stakeholders and the management.

# 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, there is partial autonomy at the PG level of Chemistry and Geography department. The syllabus is formulated by the university. But the questions for Examinations may be framed by the college subject to proper moderation under the guidance of the Board of Studies of the University.

6.2.9 How does the institution ensure that grievances /complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution is always vigilant about the grievances occurring in the campus and is dedicated to resolve them and to promote an environment that prevents further such occurrences. There are separate cells to address specific types of grievances:

- a) Women's cell
- b) Anti-ragging cell
- c) Equal Opportunity cell
- d) Gender Sensitization Committee Against Sexual Harassment (GSCASH)

Apart from this, there is a vibrant students' union where students can communicate their problems and Class Representatives (CR) are free to interact with the Principal or other faculties regarding relevant issues. Students' representatives are also members of the Governing Body and IQAC, whereby the top management may interact with the students directly and resolve grievances, if there are any. As far as the grievances of the teachers are concerned, the Teachers Council takes care of the issues and effective measures are taken in the Teachers' Council meetings. The non-teaching staff can air their grievances to the Principal directly or to the IQAC.

The nature of the grievances are analyzed and steps are taken to raise awareness so that grievances occur less frequently. A number of seminars and workshops have been organized by the grievance cells and NSS units throughout the year, aiming to encourage debate and group discussion and thereby raise the sense of social responsibility in the students. Following seminars and workshops have been organized in last four years:

- i) State-level two day Workshop on Gender Sensitivity and Sexuality, (2016) organized by GSCASH.
- ii) World AIDS day rally and awareness generation initiatives at nearby slum areas by NSS units.
- iii) **Anti-Drug** (**Substance abuse**) **rally** in collaboration with Haldia Police Station by NSS units.
- iv) **Two Thalassemia detection camp** in collaboration with Thalassemia Society of Midnapur District by NSS units.
- v) Investment Awareness Generation Programme in collaboration with Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) by NSS units.
- vi) Seminar on "International Mother Language Day: History, Tradition and Legacy" organized by NSS along with cultural programmes by the students to celebrate International Mother Tongue Day.
- vii) Seminar on "Violences: Everydayness and Extraordinary" organized by NSS in an attempt to foster notions of gender equality.
- viii) The NSS units have started a blog to disseminate information related to NSS activities of the college (url: http://nsshgc.blogspot.in/)

- ix) A Special Camp was organized in the adopted slum areas on "Life Style Management Awareness".
- x) Organization of **Legal Awareness Camp** by NSS units.

# 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these.

No court case has been filed in the last four years.

# 6.2.11 Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the institute has an effective mechanism for analyzing student feedback on various institutional activities. The institute has always considered the feedback information with utmost importance and utilized them in reviewing the policies adopted by the institutes and modifying them according as the needs of the students. The feedbacks collected in the form of questionnaire are analyzed by the IQAC. Feedbacks gathered by direct personal contact between teachers and students, or from the students approaching grievance cells, or from the communications of the students' union with the Principal have yielded proper resolution of the matter and steps are taken by the institute to prevent recurrence of such issues.

- ❖ Based on the student feedback on academic issues, new methods and ideas have been incorporated into the conventional teaching-learning strategies.
- ❖ Physical infrastructure of the classrooms and laboratories has been upgraded according to the needs of the students found in the feedbacks.
- ❖ Library facilities and internet facilities have been modernized following the analysis of the students' feedback on these issues.
- After receiving the students' feedback on overall institutional ambience in terms of report of various grievances, steps have been taken to resolve them and workshops and seminars have been organized to promote general awareness.

### **6.3** Faculty empowerment strategies

### 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

Professional development is a continuous process and the teachers regularly participate in Orientation Programmes, Workshops and Refresher Courses conducted by the various Academic Staff Colleges of the Universities, as per UGC norms and Govt. rules. The teachers are encouraged to be members of PG and UG Board of Studies of the affiliating

University and are also encouraged to act as the Head Examiner, Examiner, Scrutinizer, Paper Setter, Moderator of different Universities and other organizations conducting different examinations. The teachers are also deputed to take the charge of the college unit of Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU).

For financial work non-teaching staff have been trained in the use of COSA and HRMS softwares and e-Bantan system. At present most of the Group-C staff members are computer literate.

# 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for *faculty empowerment* through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform.

As per existing UGC norms, the teachers have to participate in orientation programme and refresher courses for their career advancement and continuous self-enrichment. The college cannot release all the teachers of a department at a time to participate in these courses. Teachers are being released ensuring that their classes will be shared by the rest of the teachers in his temporary absence so that students are not deprived of their regular teaching routine.

For any professional training it is departmentally resolved who will participate in which training. Teachers are provided on-duty leave to attend various faculty improvement programmes. To the teachers, the major motivating factor is the success of their students, not only, in the university examinations but in their future careers also. The College authority always takes initiative to appreciate the qualities, which are very special to the individual as a teacher – this always boost the morale of the individual, motivate them to pursue further in the desired direction.

The ability and opportunity to conduct funded research and acceptance of papers by peerreviewed and international journals motivate teaching staff to expand research activities. Moreover, increasing provision of updated research facilities like equipments, satellite imagery, journals, internet facilities etc. empower the faculty to conduct higher level research.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

**For Teaching Staff:** The performances of the teachers are evaluated primarily on the basis of the information from:

- i) the departmental heads
- ii) the feedbacks provided by the students and
- iii) directly by the Principal.

The teachers maintain self-appraisal reports on a daily basis and also specific self-appraisal reports as prescribed by the University Grants Commission and approved by the Government at the time of every upward movement (through Career Advancement Schemes).

Moreover, the Principal furnishes Annual Confidential Report for each and every faculty member to the Director of Public Instructions and also Special Confidential Report (SCR) as and when required in prescribed format.

For Non-teaching Staff: the non-teaching staffs of the College belong to two categories: Group-C and Group-D. They are posted in different departments and also in the Office of the Principal. They normally work according to the instructions issued by the teachers including the Head of the departments. Thus the performances of these departmental staffs are evaluated by the teachers and also by the Head of the concerned departments. The Principal also keeps watch through his machineries regarding the performances of the staff. There is scope of Career Advancement Schemes for non-teaching staff as well. They are evaluated by the concerned departments in accordance with the prescribed proforma issued by the Director of Public Instructions, Government of West Bengal. Any disciplinary action against any staff is to be taken as per West Bengal Service Rules. The Principal has to forward Annual Confidential Report and Special Confidential Report to the Education Directorate for confirmation of service of Group C staff.

# 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The Government can issue orders in case of any allegation against teaching or non-teaching staff which the Principal has to implement. The Principal can issue "Show Cause" letters to communicate the requirement for explanation or Government directives or censure.

### 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- ❖ The welfare schemes for the staff and faculty are mainly those which are available to all Government employees.
- ❖ There is a provision for residential quarters for faculties and non-teaching staff in Government Housing Estates.
- ❖ All faculty members and support staff are also entitled to get free medical treatment for them and their families in all Government Hospitals as per existing rules.
- ❖ There is a State Government Health Scheme, 2008. An employee entitled with this scheme can get cashless medical benefit upto Rs. one lakh and full reimbursement of the cost of his/her medical treatment and treatment of his/her family members in

different registered Private as well as Government hospitals. However, the employee has to forego the monthly medical allowance (Rs.300/- per month) from his salary. About 70% of the total teaching staff avails of the above welfare scheme.

- ❖ The non-teaching staff are offered bonus during the festive Puja season.
- ❖ Almost 100 percent of the Non-Teaching staff avail of the above mentioned welfare schemes.

### **6.3.6** What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Since it is a Government Institution the Principal and the Governing Body of the College have no authority to attract or retain any whole time faculty. The recruitments of the faculties and librarians are done by the Higher Education Department of the Government of West Bengal on the recommendation of the Public Service Commission (PSC), West Bengal as and when required. The matter of retention of the faculties is controlled by the Directorate of Public Instructions and the Higher Education Department. The transfers of the faculties among the different Government colleges in West Bengal are a routine matter and in most of the cases a substitute is provided while issuing transfer order for an existing teacher.

However, after retirement of any eminent teacher, if there is scarcity of teachers in the respective department, the college can send a proposal to the Higher Education Department to engage them as guest lecturer against a stipulated honourarium.

### 6.4 Financial management and resource mobilization

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resource?

A number of committees consisting of teaching and/or non-teaching staff are constituted every year to ensure democratic decision making regarding purchases and to monitor the utilization of resources. Head of the Departments are members of the Committees. Tender quotations are invited for purchase of different equipments, chemicals, stationeries under the supervision of Purchase Committee consisting of a Convener & members of teaching staff as well as representative of non-teaching staff. UGC and Higher Education Department, Govt. of west Bengal sanctions grants each year for purchasing equipment, books, chemicals, office stationeries etc. All these items are purchased through proper tender-based quotations. Payments are made by the Treasury Office.

Salary is billed through the Human Resource Management System (HRMS). Financial resources are being received directly into bank accounts and the State Government has introduced the mechanism of e-Pradan and e-Billing system thereby making the system

computerized. Records of purchases, bill and cheque registers, stock books, scholarship registers showing receipts and disbursements are maintained and regularly updated. Each committee has its own registers for maintaining records.

# 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? What was the last audit done and what are the major audits objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The last audit was conducted during 10.09.2015 to 19.09.2015 by the Audit and Accounts Department of the Government of West Bengal for the period 01.02.2011 to 31.08.2015. The major audit queries were:

- i) Retention of library books valuing Rs 46,000/- by the students and staff.
- ii) An account of furniture, computer and stationary articles of Rs 1.54 lac.
- iii) Non-revision of contractual load, unavoidable expenditure on electricity demand charges of Rs 4.65 lac.

# 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The State Government bears all the expenditures including salaries, electricity and telephone bills and gives development grants. Sanction of grants for repair, renovation, maintenance and construction are provided by the Government of West Bengal and are carried out by the PWD (Construction & Electrical).

- Scholarships for students are received from WBMDC (for SC, ST, OBC & Minority), West Bengal Government Merit & Means scholarship and Chief Minister's Fund. The last two are directly credited into the bank accounts of the beneficiary students. Only WBMDC sends maintenance allowance in the name of the Principal which is then disbursed to the respective students.
- ❖ Since this is a purely Government run college no reserve fund/corpus fund is available with the institute.

### **6.5** Internal Quality Assurance System

### **6.5.1** Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The institution has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. It was formed on 21.07.2013 as a logical corollary to the NAAC visit to our college in 2007. Our institution was graded "B" with score 71.2% by the NAAC peer team. Since its inception the IQAC has been continuously trying its level best to ensure the high quality of performance of its students and members of the teaching and non-teaching staff. Its institutional policy includes regular departmental meetings, parents-teachers meetings, tutorial and remedial classes organized specially for weaker students, industrial visits and educational tours, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, extension lectures, community service, seminars and workshops, environmental awareness, financial assistance to meritorious and needy students etc.

b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The IQAC submitted AQARs for last four academic sessions starting from 2011 to 2015. They have been approved by the management. As per AQARs, the institution during the last few years regularly held departmental meetings and parents-teachers meetings,

science fair, cultural programmes, rendered special financial help to needy and meritorious students, helped teachers participate in Orientation Programme, Refresher Course, seminars, workshops and symposiums of state, national and international level, conducted educational tours and industrial visits for students etc. The institution paid special attention to promote social and environmental awareness among its students. The students submitted projects on environment. The students received different types of government scholarships. Similarly, teachers also received funds for research by UGC, CSIR, ICHR and other funding agencies.

### c) Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, there are external members included in the IQAC. Their names are:

- i) Dr. Nimai Masant, Officer-in-Charge. Jhargram Raj College
- ii) Mr. Ujjwal Kumar Sengupta, IAS, CEO, Haldia Development Authority The external members offer valuable suggestions on many an occasion.

### d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Both the Students Union and the Alumni Association are keen on promoting the quality of the institution. They are cooperative, supportive and vigilant. The students help the institution in different activities like admission, games and sports, cultural programme, extension lectures, seminars and workshops. They also help the administration in its anti-ragging drive and cooperate with it in maintaining discipline in the campus. They also actively endeavour to promote an eco-friendly environment within the college campus. The IQAC through the management keeps in touch with them.

### e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC has some members of the teaching staff on its committee. It gets regular support and help from its non-teaching staff.

# 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.

To ensure quality and standard, the institution has an integrated framework for its academic and administrative activities. It has formed different academic and administrative committees.

### 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details, enumerating its impact.

No such measures have been taken in this regard.

# 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve institutional activities?

No formal provision for Academic Audit has been introduced yet. However, external review of academic quality is ensured in the following ways:

- i) Papers of many teachers have been published in refereed journals. Many teachers have received funds for research works.
- ii) For the students, class tests and tutorials are held regularly. Also, seminars are organized in different fields of interest. The third year students of all the departments submit projects on environmental studies. The students of the Post-Graduate Departments also submit projects.
- iii) For socially and economically backward students of the college provided with remedial coaching classes on a regular basis.

### 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The IQAC works smoothly with the management, i.e., the Governing Body, and gets support and cooperation from the Department of Higher Education, West Bengal and the UGC. The Governing Body is the highest advisory body which gives advice and support to the institution from time to time. As it is a government institute, it is directly controlled by the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal. The employees, both teaching and non-teaching, are government staff. For quality assurance the Government keeps strict vigil on this institution and at the same time helps it with administrative and financial support.

The University Grants Commission as the nodal centre of higher education has extended its hands to this institution for high standard of teaching and research.

# 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome.

❖ The departmental teachers monitor the performance of the students by their response in the classrooms as well as by their performance in the class tests conducted by the department.

- ❖ The Principal ensures effective teaching-learning in the college by constant interaction with the Departmental Heads and with individual teachers, as and when required.
- ❖ The IQAC also suggests the departments regarding the effective way of teaching-learning. The performance of the teachers gets reflected in the Annual Quality Assurance Report.
- ❖ Assessments of feedbacks from different stakeholders like the students, especially the Students' Union, parents also help the process of monitoring the teaching-learning in the college.

### 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The IQAC generally communicates its policies and decisions to various stakeholders through notices and letters. Regular meetings are held among teachers and students on various important issues like admission, examination, cultural programme, beautification of the campus etc. Regular meetings are held between teachers of a department to ensure the internal quality of the department. The meetings are also held with the members of the non-teaching staff. Notices are pasted on the notice boards, notice book and in many cases in the college website. The Alumni Association and the guardians are contacted as and when required.

### CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

The college boasts of many species of flora and fauna. The campus is a favourite spot for many species of birds that come to feed and build their nests. The *shimul*, *palash* and *bakul* trees are treat to one's eyes when they are in full bloom. Besides, the college has many more species of trees such as *akashmoni*, *jarul*, *sishu*, *deodar* etc. Many species of bird use these trees for nesting every year. Snails and squirrels are also regular residents of the campus.

Following measures are taken routinely that reflect the environmental awareness on the part of the stakeholders:

- ❖ It is mandatory for each of the Final Year students to undertake an environment related project as per University guidelines.
- ❖ The water samples from college are routinely collected and tested.
- ❖ The college has imposed restriction on use of plastic inside the campus.
- Chewing of pan- masalas and gutkhas inside the college campus is prohibited.
- Clean drainage system to stop water logging and growth of mosquitoes and other parasites.
- ❖ 'Save Energy' initiative of NSS makes the students take care to switch off lights and fans before leaving the class rooms to save electricity and power.
- ❖ The admission, the student affairs, billing, the scholarship delivery system and several other important activities are largely paper free.
- ❖ Pasting posters on the college building in any form- graffiti or paper is completely prohibited. There are dedicated boards on the campus to help in the percolation of information.
- ❖ Our waste disposal system is managed by Haldia Municipality.
- Clean and filtered drinking water throughout the premises.
- ❖ Canteen committee checks the quality and taste of the food supplied in canteen.
- Quality of drinking water is regularly monitored.

#### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Haldia Govt.College has an environment friendly campus. From time to time the Officer-in-Charge holds meetings with the PWD (civil) concerning upgradation of infrastructure and the maintenance of the garden features as one of the agenda. Other than this tree planting exercises are part of the regular activities of the NSS unit of the College. The College has been made a plastic free zone and students are constantly sensitized about clean and green environment through talks, poster campaigning, etc. Plants are counted every year and naming of the plants of the College garden with the help of an expert taxonomist is done. The P.W.D Department, Government of West Bengal, in consultation with the Principal regularly monitors the green cover of the college by de-weeding activities in the play ground and other common areas for maintaining the beautification. Annual plantation programmes are organized in the college to increase the greenery of the campus.

### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Accumulation of water within the college campus is prevented to check malarial and dengue infestation, if any. Drinking water is regularly monitored for E.-coli. Plastic free premises are maintained by the NSS volunteers. Hazardous waste management is done at regular intervals. Moreover, primary importance is given to reduce the volume of chemical wastes generated in our laboratories and accordingly the following initiatives have been taken:

- Purchase of smallest quantity of hazardous chemicals required for our laboratories.
- Purchase of mercury-free instruments.
- ❖ Substituting hazardous chemicals with non-hazardous chemicals whenever possible.
- ❖ Waste from Chemistry labs are disposed of in sealed containers. Cleanliness in the laboratories is maintained, by regular dusting and wiping apart from which most of the instruments are kept covered to protect from dust and obtain better efficiency
- \*Energy conservation: Energy conservation is a pre-requisite to the eco-friendly environment issue. The concern for energy conservation prevails among both the staff and the students. At the end of the day, all electronic and electrical installations are immediately switched off and the devices are unplugged. If, at times, the students forget to switch off the lights and fans after the classes, the vigilant non-teaching staff members immediately take care to switch these off. Use of AC machines is regulated. Doors and windows have tight seals and are closed when the air conditioner is running. The use of generators at the time of power cut and that of the emergency power supply is kept to a minimum. Effort has also been taken to supplant the energy consumable lamps with modern energy saving CFL lamps and tubes. The college uses environment friendly and star rated instruments for moderate consumption of energy. "Sleep" mode on computers and monitors are activated. Equipments are checked regularly for proper operation and maintenance needs.
- \* Use of renewable energy: Nil
- \* Water harvesting: Nil
- \* Check dam construction: As the College is in an urban area this is not under the purview of the institution.
- \* Efforts for Carbon neutrality: Plantation of trees & maintenance of adequate greenery in the College campus. Green plants are instrumental in consuming Carbon-dioxide (mainly released as an automobile exhaust and also during exhalation) and releasing oxygen which is vital for respiration. All cars parked inside the College pertain to anti-pollution standards. This minimizes the release of carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide, the key ingredients of automobile waste. By turning off equipment when not in use. Use of low energy light bulbs. Efficient use of air-conditioner.
- \* Plantation- Every year tree plantation programme is organized under the aegis of the college NSS Unit. The staff and the students participate in this programme with complete enthusiasm.

- \* Hazardous waste management: Certain safety norms are followed by the Chemistry Department to protect the environment from hazardous pollutants that are commonly produced in the laboratories during regular practical classes, both Honours and General. Students working within the laboratory (around 300 per session) always have the chance of exposure to toxic fumes. This is taken care of by running efficient and multiple exhaust fans in the laboratories during class hours. This helps to drive away the fumes and reduces their concentration within the confines of the laboratory. Handling of reagents which produce pungent irritating fumes are always carried out within fume chambers built within each laboratory. Broken glass pieces of laboratory glass apparatus are manually crushed before disposal. The College also organizes pestcontrol drives annually, especially, malaria and dengue-larva extermination in both campus& students' hostels. fire-extinguisher system has been placed in laboratories.
- \* e-waste management: E-waste management- proposals have been made and forwarded to higher authorities.

### 7.2 Innovations

- 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.
  - ❖ The College began subscribing to inventories like INFLIBNET
  - ❖ Introduction of Postgraduate courses: Postgraduate courses were introduced in the Department of Chemistry, and Department of Geography from 2015-16.
  - Scientific Waste Management: The College has implemented efficient waste disposal management procedures.
  - Publication of Conference Proceedings: During the national seminar, the seminar organizing team of the college published Conference Proceedings with ISBN number.
  - ❖ Transparent and fully operational online admission process (2011-12): Enrolment and submission of forms are online. Percolation of information in college website with regional news channels percolating information. Merit Lists are available online, and may be compared, objected to (if any) through web portals. After counselling, fees are also deposited to the Bank. So there is little scope of merit being compromised.
  - ❖ Digitalization of student database and NEFT transfer of scholarships: Student records are digitally maintained since a long time now. Now the bank account of the students is directly linked with scholarship awarding agencies and the scholarship amounts are directly debited to the students account.
  - ❖ Implementation of Kanyashree Scheme (One time financial assistance) of Government of West Bengal: A number of girl students were benefitted under this scheme. From 2013-14, every year on average 150 girl students are benefitted under this scheme.
  - ❖ E-payment through the E-PRADAN portal of Government of West Bengal. This has led to transparent and paperless bill processing and bill payment system. Staff salary

- is COSA compliant and linked directly to government exchequer. Thus bill preparation, scrutiny and payment of salaries are almost paper-free.
- ❖ Thrust on Outreach Activities: From 2010-11, the college is forging cooperation with neighbouring communities. The NSS units of the college have adopted two *bastis* and regularly hold various outreach programmes in those areas. These initiatives positively impacted the academics of the participating students too.
- ❖ Poster and Graffiti free campus: The College is seen and revered by the students as a sacred place. This spirit of cleanliness and maintaining the beauty of its campus is inculcated through generations and the campus has been declared as a plastic free and poster free zone.
- ❖ Anti Ragging Cell: An anti- ragging cell is functioning in the college. A student monitoring system through CCTV has been ensured in the campus. In the college, every student and every guardian has to undertake legal responsibility as an affidavit at the time of admission.
- ❖ Cell against Sexual Harassment: This cell was constituted in the 2014-15 session. The students are sensitized about various gender issues and against issues related to sexual harassment through various seminars, campaign and workshops.
- ❖ Students are made aware of humanitarian issues through awareness programmes by the NSS unit.
- ❖ The fitness centre has been better equipped with government funds to encourage the habit of regular exercise.
- ❖ To teach the students in a more illustrative and comprehensive way, teachers of most Departments use LCD projector and PPT in the class room.
- ❖ Almost all departments periodically organize National level seminars, workshops as well as in house interdisciplinary workshops in which students are encouraged to take leading roles.
- ❖ Students design interesting experiments, power point presentation and outlay posters under the guidance of the teachers. Students' seminars are also organised in many departments.
- **!** Emphasis on dissertation papers and project works in the Postgraduate Courses.
- Film shows of literary texts in the Department of English are held on a regular basis.
- ❖ Salary of the staff through COSA software is enabled.
- ❖ Installations of CCTV cameras in different locations of the college campus are in place to ensure the security measure within it.
- ❖ Installation of the computer based GIS information system in the department of Geography is enabled from 2014.
- ❖ Introduction of WI-FI network in the college provides efficient, secure internet accessibility to faculty.
- SMART Classes have been introduced from 2015 in the department of Geography to facilitate and enhance student-teacher interaction.
- Central Library has been upgraded with the installation of UGC INFLIBNET for online Library accessibility to various e-resources for the staff of the college from 2015.
- ❖ A Career Counselling Cell has been established with the goal of increasing the scope and exposure of students in the job market.

#### 7.3 Best Practices

### **Best Practice 1**

1. Title of the Practice: Strong Extension Activities

#### 2. Goal

Extension activities provide a link between the college and the society. Since the goal of education is holistic development of students' personality the extension activities impart and nurture the human values among the students. It makes them sensitive towards different social issues and transforms them into responsible citizens. The extension activities are carried out through NSS and NCC units of this college. Participation in these extension activities enable them to communicate with the society and build among them the spirit of social service.

#### 3. The Context

Haldia, an industrial town, is a mosaic of different groups of people who belong to different class, caste, ethnic and religious categories. A vast majority of its inhabitants are migrants working in various organised and unorganised sectors in this town. Many students of this college are first generation learners or are from migrant families. There is a felt need of fulfilling the institutional social responsibility by reaching to the weaker and underprivileged section of the society. The qualities of leadership, team spirit and discipline are also inculcated among students through these activities.

#### 4. The Practice

The NSS units of this college have been working for the benefit of the college as well as its neighbourhoods for decades now. The NCC unit has also been re-established in the academic session 2016-17. At the time of admission the students are informed about the functions and goals of NSS and NCC. They are motivated to join these units by organizing campaigns throughout the college. The Programme Officers of both the units of NSS and A.N.O of NCC personally visit each and every department of the college to explain the mission and vision of these two social service units. Regular classes of NCC and NSS units are held at the college premises. The students participate enthusiastically in various camps and other activities. Regular college cleaning activities are organised by NSS volunteers. Apart from college centric activities students are also encouraged to engage with the neighbouring communities more actively. In order to enhance institution-community interaction, the NSS units of the college organize several outreach campaigns such as HIV/AIDS awareness camp, anti-alcohol consumption camp, legal awareness camp etc.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

- ❖ Two student volunteer was participated in National Integration Camp at Mumbai University in 2015.
- ❖ One NSS volunteers selected for International Cultural Exchange among Youth at International Level at China, in 2014.
- ❖ Mahua Patra, the then Programme Officer of NSS Unit I was awarded Best Programme Officer Award in 2014.
- One student volunteer was awarded the Best Volunteer Award in 2014.
- ❖ Two student volunteers were selected for Pre-republic day parade at Gurudas College, Kolkata in 2013.
- ❖ One student volunteer was awarded Best Volunteer Award in 2013.

### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- ❖ Frequent transfer of faculty trained and working as Programme Officer of NSS.
- **\*** Lack of proper infrastructural facilities.
- ❖ Lack of fund for proper execution of all planned initiatives.
- ❖ Difficulty in motivating students at the end of the session when they get busy with the preparation of their exams.
- ❖ Difficulty in establishing rapport with the neighbourhood community.

### **Best Practice 2**

#### 1. Title of the Practice: Students are motivated to think beyond curriculum

#### 2. Goal

It is quite often seen that students in educational institutions fall victims to the tyranny of pure theoretical learning and fail to connect their knowledge with the world outside their classrooms. They become storehouses of knowledge without any idea of how to put that knowledge into practice. We consider this to be nothing short of a failure of the education system and try our best to eliminate this problem. In this college our focus is on helping students to relate theoretical learning with their everyday experiences.

#### 3. The Context

Such an endeavour necessarily entails a conflict with conventional approaches to teaching. The age-old lecture method augmented by the chalk-and-talk technique needs to be modified to incorporate more innovative as well as interactive ones. Therefore, the

teachers had to encounter quizzical looks from students and take it in their stride when some eyebrows were raised among those expecting traditional teaching.

#### 4. The Practice

Alongside the conventional lecture method of instruction the teachers of this college also use interactive methods like discussions in the form of focus groups. The focus is always on the possibilities of building a strong connection between the world of the syllabus and the world the students inhabit. The big bad world lying outside the classroom is repeatedly contextualised inside and the boundaries between text and context intentionally blurred. Students here are also regularly instructed to get involved in extracurricular activities that can actually enhance their grasp of the curriculum. Film-shows, group discussions, debates, workshops, cultural presentations etc. are some of these activities. The students are also guided through the intense maze of the internet and initiated into the fascinating world of blogs, digital archives etc.

Anything extra comes with its price. In this case, the price is the added workload that teachers and other staff have to shoulder. Of course, our teachers do it willingly and with gusto. There is one problem though which poses a serious threat to this practice and remains its grave limitation. It is the overall system of undergraduate level higher education under the affiliation of Vidyasagar University. Teaching is on one end of the spectrum, the other end being examinations. And examinations along with their evaluations are conducted by the university. There being no possibility of any coordination between the approaches adopted by our best practice and the university's examination system, it becomes an unimaginably uphill task for the teachers to implement the practice. Had the college been an autonomous institution all its novel and advanced teaching strategies would have paid off. Nevertheless, even without being complemented by the university our college continues to believe in its practice and carries on with it.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

Students are slowly becoming aware of the different issues which surround the everydayness. They follow different events, academic blogs and voluntarily discuss issues with teachers in and after class hours. Several departments encourage students to make presentations, an endeavour which is running successfully.

Success should not always be assessed by examination performances alone. Our teachers believe that whatever the success rate in examinations, our students mature into socially responsible individuals as a result of our innovative approaches to teaching. Not just bookish knowledge geeks, our students prove themselves in the outer world as truly educated human beings.

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Sometimes, students take time to adjust with these innovations which are outside the conventional mode of teaching. However, on a more serious plane, the college needs better library facilities along with high speed internet connection and smart class rooms to make such endeavours successful.

- The departmental faculties often organize the students to experience different movies including documentaries relevant to several topics to the syllabi, and the content of the movie(s) and/or documentaries are analyzed by the faculties by the interactive sessions with the students.

- Different classroom teaching method (like- Lecture Method, Story Telling, Seminar, Interactive Method, Conversation Method etc.) are practiced by the faculties in context to the content of the topic of class.
- Photographs and Video Clips as texts of Academic Fieldwork in Social-Cultural Anthropology, and different prehistoric contents (like-Exploration and Excavation Method) are displayed through LCD projector to reflect the essence of the subject and to ensure the exposure of the students towards the applied aspects of their theoretical knowledge.
- The department organized academic fieldwork (in Social-Cultural Anthropology) in every year for both General and Honours students preferably in rural/tribal setting under the curriculum of Vidyasagar University. These fieldworks enrich the students' practical experiences of culture that they learn in their theoretical classes.

- All sanctioned posts not filled up.

- Replacement and repairing of the departmental instruments and equipment is quite a long term process.
- There are no sufficient grants for invited lectures, departmental seminars and/or workshops at college level.
- Being a Government College the official process lingers the immediate academic activities.
- Absence of suitable and relevant optional subjects, like Zoology and Botany
  affects the student strength and declines the scope to the Honours and General
  Students to appear in different academic competitive examinations like-West
  Bengal School Service Commission.

#### **Opportunity:**

- Extension of the Departmental space for smooth management of academic practices.
- Wide open professional scope for the students in academic, organized and unorganized sectors.
- Revised syllabi enhance the chances for the students to relate their theoretical knowledge with applied aspects of the subject.
- CAS policy motivates and accelerates improvement the efficiency of the faculties.
- Wide and varied scope for collaborative and interdisciplinary research.

• The essence and exposure of the subject reflects the scope for better social policy, action and wellbeing.

#### **Challenges:**

#### 33. Teaching methods adopted to improve student learning:

- a) We conduct regularly internal assessments, take special classes and arrange fortnightly examinations, quiz, and interactive discussion sessions besides the regular classes. The department supplies notes, deliver demonstrations on difficult topics for helping the students to perform better in theoretical as well as practical paper also on a regular basis. We Provide students with reading materials like journals, reference books, information from the internet etc. Counseling (academic) for better performance and providing them addresses of institutions and guidance for career courses. Giving career guidance especially to the outgoing students by providing them materials from newspapers and concerned websites. Mentoring and strengthening tips are provided to individual students.
- b) For courses where the texts of Novels, Poetry, Dramas or Essays are taught, the teachers generally adopt the traditional method of Chalk and Talk. But this method is enriched with the interaction with the students where the teachers involve the students generally in three principal ways: a) Debate and discussion on a particular issue of the text, b) Quiz on a particular part of the text, c) Assignment on a particular topic of the text.
- c) In linguistics, the teachers use LCD projector for an audio-visual presentation and also the interactive electronic board as and when necessary.
- d) In Folkloristics, the teachers show different CDs and DVDs of the documents of folk culture through Projector.
- e) The teachers show the film version of the texts belonged to syllabus. Apart from that, film / audio version of other texts are shown to the students.

#### 34. Participation in Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and Extension activities:

- Students are involves in various social activities through NSS & NCC.
- Folklore Projects organized by this Department encourage our students to mix up with Folk artists and artisans in remote villages associated with these culture and by this keen association, our students are inspired to be a part of folk literature and art in future and to do something positive for the development of folklore and the poor artists related with this profession.

#### 35. SWOC analysis of the department and future plans:

#### **Strengths:**

- Energetic young fulltime faculty members have created a very balanced academic environment in the department.
- Departmental library is rich and constantly refurbished. The students can directly access this library.
- The journal section is also very rich which facilitates students in their different project works.
- Good Reputation of this Department
- Excellent and intelligent students study in this Department and that is reflected in the University results.

#### Weaknesses:

- The students coming from the rural background are not aware with the perfect language style of present day Bengali language and also with currents and cross currents of Bengali literature.
- The poor knowledge of English creates problems for the students of Bengali, because many a times they have to read some English Texts for comparative study.
- Scarcity in the number of the sanctioned fulltime faculty members is also a source of difficulty.
- Non-availability of rooms and space is also a severe problem for this growing department for which we cannot increase the number of books in departmental library and to introduce a folklore museum-cum-study Centre.
- Modern equipment's are not available.

#### **Opportunities:**

- Students of the Department have the Opportunity to appear for the competitive School Service examinations (Primary to high School level) as Bengali is a compulsory School subject.
- A degree in Bengali literature acts as a gateway to varied career options like Advertising, Mass Communication, Print-Media, Audio-Visual, Animation and Digital Media.
- Bengali and English the two language Departments have the opportunity to arrange

Inter-Departmental discussion that can enrich the faculty.

#### **Challenges:**

- The competitive market is posing a great challenge for the students of Bengali. The number of students passing out with Bengali as a major subject and the availability of service sector are not at all compatible with each other.
- The fast changing grammatical aspects of Bengali Language is also posing a challenge to the fresh learners as sometimes they cannot understand what to follow.
- To motivate the students for acquiring the ability to read and understand the text written in English is a challenge that the department should take up.

#### **Future plans of the department:**

- To introduce regular post graduate course.
- To build up sufficient space for folk-archive.
- Setting up of a School Service Commission Exam. Training Centre.
- Setting up of a Language Lab. for the study of Comparative Linguistics in collaboration with English Department.
- Regular shows of the films relevant to the syllabus are going on.
- Regular visit to places of literary interest and historical importance are arranged by the department frequently on holidays.
- To educate students with different types of skills to face the global challenges.

- There is also shortage of academic technical staff (Group-C and Group-D) in the Department

- Faculties serve as paper setters, examiners and reviewers of Vidyasagar University.
- Teachers supervise the students in their field studies for completion of their 3<sup>rd</sup> Year course (both Honours and General).

#### Weakness:

- Very few numbers of students takes this subject in their UG course.
- Students in this area are not interested in economics.
- Students and their parents have an inbuilt fear about the subject, Economics
- Students and their parents bear a cliché idea that economics students lack job opportunities as they are not properly aware of the opportunities of the subject in corporate and industrial sector.

- Lacks proper and separate computer laboratory, which is very necessary for studying Economics.
- Deficiency of classrooms is a major problem and it becomes impossible to take two classes simultaneously.
- Does not possess a proper reading room.

#### **Opportunities:**

- Re-structuring of the departmental seminar library and making it more user friendly.
- Organising field studies for enhancing knowledge about the rural economy, functioning of the decentralization process in West Bengal.
- Arranging small scale surveys of the local industries and related data analysis to enhance the theoretical knowledge of the students.
- Organizing community action plans against industries for local pollutions
- Arranging interdisciplinary studies to popularize Economics
- Introducing Masters in Development Studies

#### **Challenges:**

- Few students take this subject in their honours course compared to other departments of the college.
- Haldia is a major industrial and port town in West Bengal and, therefore, demand for
  economists as firm / research analyst already exists in this region. Thus one major
  challenge is to encourage more students to take this subject in their UG course and raise
  their attraction towards Economics.
- Economics faculty earnestly wants to attract students in Economics (UG Course) but the
  department lacks manpower and teachers to organize special workshops or student
  counseling camps for encouraging students.
- As the college is one of the few colleges which offer Economics honours in under graduation course in combination with Statistics as a subsidiary subject under Vidyasagar University, the department has a big challenge ahead to build up future economists by increasing the quality and quantity of students.

#### **Future plans:**

- To arrange a national seminar in the next academic year.
- To arrange a workshop or Counseling camp for higher secondary students to attract them towards Economics
- To construct a proper computer laboratory, a smart classroom and a reading room.
- Introduction of Interdisciplinary Post Graduate Courses.
- Collaborative Major Research Projects with other colleagues and Universities
- In future we have a planning for community development. We have an idea to calculate the environmental cost of the pollutants emitted by the local industries through Social Cost Benefit Analysis. In this respect, we shall include the local inhabitants through participatory process and make them aware about the facts. Students of the department with the faculty shall try to mobile the mass for demanding subsidy for their suffering from such an intensive pollution. The commoners will be helped to raise their voices for imposing pollution taxes on the industries so that pollution can be reduced in the long run.



- There exists a very friendly relationship between students and teachers of the department.
- Regular student seminars and film shows are organized by the department.
- International business houses like TCS and Wipro regularly offer placements to students of the college and English Honours students enjoy a distinct advantage.
- Students enjoy the facility of a good seminar library, with more than 500 books, in the department.

#### Weaknesses

- Communication skills of students need to be improved.

- a) Library: Seminar Library: The seminar libraries are kind of extensions of the main library. Books are borrowed from the main library and entered in the stock of the seminar library. The departmental seminar library has sufficient text and reference books to meet the students' requirements. All students of the PG course and Honours stream use the library regularly. One of the faculty members conducts the library works as seminar library in charge.
- b) Internet facilities for Staff & Students: A central computer room has been established in the department. The department has 14 desktop computers of which 7 have active internet connection, 3 printers and one Ricoh copiers/scanners and another copier. Most of the Department is endowed with Wi-Fi facility as part of the networking done under the DST-FIST assistance received by the college.

### **Strengths:**

### **Strength:**

- All the faculty members of the department are dedicated and devoted to their responsibilities.
- The students of the department maintain good academic discipline.
- The department has sufficient number of class rooms to hold honours and general classes for all three years.
- The department has a computer laboratory which is well-equipped to conduct computer programming and computer oriented courses. The department provides internet and LAN facilities to the students.
- The department has a good seminar library with sufficient number of excellent books on Mathematics.
- The interaction between students and teachers takes place in a homely environment in this department.
- Students feel free to interact with the teachers. Apart from Mathematics related problems, other queries are also taken care of by the teachers outside classes.
- Students are motivated to think with clarity and logical reasoning, guided by intuition and common sense. It is desired that they will grow up to be good human beings.

### Weakness:

- The department has no non-teaching staff to offer support in departmental activities.
- We also do not have a computer laboratory assistant.
- Students are from different backgrounds. Some of them are first-generation learners of Mathematics. Some of them are from poor financial backgrounds. So, it becomes difficult to inculcate mathematical discipline to them as they do not have the basic support system in their homes.
- Due to the transfer of teachers some of the teaching posts lie vacant over long periods of time.
- We do not have access to good mathematical Journals as no financial support is available for good journals.

### **Opportunities:**

- We try to make our students academically sound so that they can get entry into Institutes of global repute for their higher studies after completing the undergraduate course.
- We encourage our students for greater proficiency in soft skills and the college tries to provide the support with technical and infrastructural resources.
- Students are encouraged to take part in short term courses in Mathematics in different mathematical schools, to appear for IIT JAM, apply for any other competitive examination and also to apply for fellowships in research institutes.

#### **Challenges:**

- The department has to take necessary steps to fill vacant posts of teachers and possibly two non-teaching posts and a laboratory assistant.
- We have to take remedial steps to motivate students who are first generation learners. We also have to provide support to the students who are financially poor as far as possible.

To bridge this gap we would like totry to arrange a coherent series of lectures at the elementary level by experts in various fields of mathematics so that the natural love is not lost. The senior students will also be benefited by such lecture series.
- The advanced undergraduate students need to know what opportunities of research are there in our country for higher Mathematics. In this respect our future plan will be to organize seminars and one day lectures regularly for this purpose.

# SECTION F: POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

# **Post-accreditation Initiatives**

Haldia Government College was accredited with Grade B in Cycle I of NAAC Accreditation on 31.03.2007. The Peer Team suggested some major guidelines for quality enhancement and maintenance of the institute. Subsequently, for quality assurance, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was established. The IQAC plays a major role in ensuring quality enhancement of the college. It has emerged as a regularly functioning unit to sustain the quality of academic excellence. It prepares Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) of the college each year.

Following are the post-accreditation initiatives undertaken by the college:

- ❖ Regular postgraduate courses in Chemistry and Geography were introduced from the 2015 - 16 academic session.
- ❖ The teachers are encouraged to apply for Major and Minor Research Projects offered by different funding agencies to promote the culture of research activity in the institute. During the last five years the college has had 18 (ongoing and completed) Minor Research Projects and 1 Major Research Project.
- ❖ The college has organized quite a few value based special lectures and seminars to provide inspiration to the young learners and enhance their knowledge. Initiatives have been taken to organize UGC and state government sponsored national, state-level seminars on different academic areas.
- ❖ The departments have also been constantly encouraged to hold student-seminars. As a result many departments have come up with interesting ways of making students engage with meaningful academic presentations and interactions within the classroom.
- ❖ Departments are encouraged to regularly hold Remedial as well as Tutorial classes to address the specific needs of weaker sections of students.
- ❖ The college library is gearing up to become a major Learning Resource. It is now a subscriber of the INFLIBNET NLIST database. It has also initiated necessary steps for automation of the library through KOHA software.
- ❖ Complete online admissions both in undergraduate and postgraduate courses have been successfully introduced from the 2014- 15 academic session.

- ❖ The National Service Scheme (NSS) units of the college have carried out many important and meaningful activities in the recent years. Adoption of slums, special camps aimed at uplift of living conditions of the neighbourhood, community health and hygiene awareness drive, pollution awareness, literacy campaigns, blood donation camps, social audit, legal aid service programmes, cleanliness drives in the premises etc. are some of the prime measures taken by the NSS in recent years.
- ❖ The NCC unit of the college was introduced in 2015. Since then it has participated in more than 10 camps and training programmes (all India firing competitions, trekking, national integration camps, combined annual training camps etc.) conducted in different colleges and other institutions within the state and elsewhere. Our cadets have performed with distinction in national and state-level Rebublic Day parades. Different sensitization programmes, campus cleaning activities etc. have also been conducted by the NCC unit.
- ❖ Choice-based Credit System has already been introduced in the postgraduate courses from the academic session 2016 − 17 as per Vidyasagar University curriculum.
- ❖ Management of the Pay Roll and the Accounting System has been upgraded through the introduction of COSA, E-Pradan and E-Bantan softwares.
- ❖ High speed broadband internet connection has been successfully made available to all departments, the Principal's Office, the Central Library and the Students' Union Room. All these are also effectively connected through LAN. Moreover, the whole academic building has now been connected with Wi-Fi network which students, teachers, non-teaching staff members can access round the clock. The hostels too shall have the same access shortly.
- ❖ A separate Canteen Building has been constructed on the premises and designed with separate seating facilities for students and teachers. The canteen provided different hygienic food items at cheap rates.
- Placement facilities are being provided on regular basis from 2013 to the students. Different organizations hold Campus Recruitment programmes each year from which several students have obtained jobs.

- ❖ The college is equipped with a 50 KV Kohler silent, auto- start, pollution-free, diesel power generator set which can supply additional power to the entire academic building during power-cuts or emergency shortages.
- ❖ Both the boys' and girls' hostels have been renovated thoroughly during the financial year 2016 − 17 with funds sanctioned by the state government.
- ❖ The college has a vibrant Alumni Association which organizes an annual Reunion along with different programmes contributing to the improvement of the overall academic atmosphere of the college.
- ❖ Regular Parent-teacher meets are held in every department where problems of the students are addressed and valuable suggestions received from parents by the departments.
- ❖ Three submersible pumps have been installed to supply water to the academic building and hostels of the college. Advanced RO water purifier systems have been installed at several places in the academic building in order to supply safe and pure drinking water to students. Moreover, departments, the staff-room as well as the college office have also been equipped with water purifying systems.
- ❖ The PWD (Civil) has undertaken a plan to install fire-extinguishing systems in the academic building and hostels which is expected to be complete in the next few months.
- ❖ Initiatives are under way for the construction of a chemical sludge discharge pit on the premises for the department of Chemistry.
- ❖ The government has taken initiatives to install a solar energy system on the roof of the academic building in order to procure solar power as an alternate energy resource.
- Arrangements are present in the college for smooth movement of physically challenged persons (ramps, wheelchair etc.).
- ❖ The college has a well-equipped gym which students and staff members can access for workout.
- ❖ Every department has ICT enabled teaching-learning infrastructure. Some departments have Smart Classrooms too. There are two virtual classrooms which departments use according to their needs.

❖ The college has a UGC Network Resource Centre since 2004 which has gradually been upgraded by increasing the number of computers and enhancing the net connectivity. This centre is used by teachers and students.

The post-accreditation initiatives indicate that quality enhancement in every sphere of institutional development is the prime objective of Haldia Government College. The college is relentlessly pursuing excellence in areas of academic, extra-curricular and extension activities. The institution believes that although perfect excellence is never fully achieved, if the desire and goodwill are strong enough it can surely be approached. 


